The Masonic Memorial Service held in the Presbyterian Church on Sunday last was largely attended. Some sixty members listened to the Rev. A. W. Hare's discourse, visiting brethren being from Port Dover and Hagersville.

The Entrance Examinations closed on Friday evening last there being about 30 candidates which wrote. ## Death of Former Jarvis Resident.

The death occurred in London on Saturday last of Mr. Joseph Ivey, of Port Dover, formerly of Jarvis.

The deceased, who had been in poor health for some time past, suffering from hardening of the arteries, was making a visit to his daughter, Mrs. Frank McCormick, in London, when he was stricken to his bed, and for the past four months has been hovering between life and death, and on Saturday last, the end came.

Mr. Ivey was well known in this vicinity, having lived the best part of his life in this place. While here he owned and operated the elevator, to the east of Main St., as well as operating this farm now owned by John Wadham. Some four years ago he bought the grist mill at Port Dover, where he has resided ever since.

While here, he was an active member of the Methodist church and by his sterling character and jovial nature he won many friends and his demise will be universally mourned by all who knew him.

He leaves to mourn his loss besides his sorrowing widow, two sons, Stanford of Montreal and Charles, at home, and two daughters, Mrs. Brooks of Beaton and Mrs. Frank McCormick of London. He is also survived by one sister and three brothers, namely, Mrs. Byrne Allen of this place, John D., of Toronto, Thomas, of Carmen, Man., and Charles, of London.

The funeral took place in London on Tuesday last from his daughter's residence to Mount Pleasant cemetery.

## Decease of Mrs. Robinson

As a result of a paralytic stroke, which occurred on the 20th inst., Elizabeth Parkinson, relict of the late Moses Robinson, passed away at her home in Walpole on Friday afternoon.

Her sudden demise was a shock to this community as she had been unusually cheerful just previous to being stricken.

Deceased was born in Lancashire, England, in the year 1840. She emigrated to this section of Canada in the early days of its settlement. Soon after coming to this country she was united in marriage to Moses Robinson and together they endured for many years the struggles of which none but pioneers know.

Five sons and five daughters blessed the union, eight of whom survive: Richard, William and Alice, at home; Thomas, of Wabigoon; Moses, of Fort William; Mrs. John Jackson, Sask.; Mrs. Mary Davis, of Nanticoke, and Charles, of Vancouver. Her husband and two daughters, Mrs. Jos. Hill and Miss Margaret, predeceased her.

Her presence will be missed not only in the home but in the community, who has so long been a valued friend and neighbor and the sympathy of a large circle goes out to the sorrowing family in this hour of trial. Interment took place at Christ Church Cemetery, Nanticoke, on Tuesday, the 26th inst., services being conducted by the Rev. Mr. Brand.
