The Haldimand Socks League has reason to be proud of its efforts in providing foot comfort to the boys of the country at present at the front. According to the report appended the League has certainly not only done its best but has also been successful in its efforts to provide socks for the boys of the front.

Words have been received from the boys of the front that they are very comfortable in their feet. This is due to the fact that the League has provided them with the best quality of socks. The League has also been successful in its efforts to provide socks for the boys of the front.

For your information I should say that the 35th Bn. became the 4th Res. Bn. The number of socks received from the 114th Bn. was 19 officers and 277 other ranks. Recently 10 officers and 116 other ranks, including 10 officers and 116 other ranks, Indians, were transferred to the 107 Bn. at Whitby. In regard to socks I shall be glad to receive the shipment which you have forwarded and have them distributed among the men that remain of the 114th Bn. This battalion is now reinforcing two battalions in France which are composed of men from the western part of Ontario. I had a letter recently from one of the commanding officers in which he stated they were in sore need of socks. I am sending them some 50 pairs of a surplus I had of a donation to the old 35th Bn. but this is only a small part of their requirement. The necessity for warm footwear is great until June 1st for the mud in that part of the line which we occupy does not disappear till about that time. I am stating this in the hope that the good work you are doing will not be discontinued and also that you will permit the forwarding of any supplies you may send even though they do not reach all original 114th men. They certainly will reach men who are in need. We forwarded these through the Field Comforts Committee who are able to ensure prompt delivery. The home made socks are so much more comfortable than the factory kind.


Hoping you will continue your splendid work and be assured that some Canadian boy will be grateful even though he did not enlist with the 114th Bn. Wishing every success

A Vegetable Garden for Every Home



In this year of supreme effort Britain and her armies must have ample supplies of food, and Canada is the great source upon which they rely. Everyone with a few square feet of ground can contribute to victory by growing vegetables.

Four Patriotic Reasons for Growing Vegetables

1. It saves money that you would otherwise spend for vegetables.
2. It helps to lower the "High cost of living."
3. It helps to enlarge the urgently needed surplus of produce for export.
4. Growing your own vegetables saves labor of others whose effort is needed for other vital war work.

The Department of Agriculture will help you

The Ontario Department of Agriculture appeals to Horticultural Societies to devote at least one evening meeting to the subject of vegetable growing; manufacturers, labor unions, lodges, school boards, etc., are invited to actively encourage home gardening. Let the slogan for 1917 be, "A vegetable garden for every home."

Organizations are requested to arrange for instructive talks by practical gardeners on the subject of vegetable growing. In cases where it is impossible to secure suitable local speakers, the Department of Agriculture will, on request, send a suitable man.

The demand for speakers will be great. The number of available experts being limited, the Department urgently requests that arrangements for meetings be made at once; if local speakers cannot be secured, send applications promptly.

The Department suggests the formation of local organizations to stimulate the work by offering prizes for best vegetable garden. It is prepared to assist in any possible way any organization that may be conducting a campaign for vegetable production on vacant lots. It will do so by sending speakers, or by supplying expert advice in the field.

To any one interested, the Department of Agriculture will send literature giving instructions about implements necessary and methods of preparing the ground and cultivating the crop. A plan of a vegetable garden indicating suitable crops to grow, best varieties and their arrangement in the garden, will be sent free of charge to any address.
