Letter from Leo Proud

Crowboro Camp, Eng., Feb. 19, 1917.

Mr. and Mrs. J. Bush, Nantouke, No. 1.

My Dear Friends: For some time I have been going to write you but my case has been much the same as that of 'the little girl that was always going to.' That is the title of a story in one of the school readers. Procrastination is the thief of time. Nearly two months have passed since I thought of writing to you.

As you will notice we have had a 'shift'. We are becoming accustomed to them now, I hope that we have only one yet to make—to France, before we start on the backward trip which surely will be more speedy.

Just as soon as the spring opens up we will have the chance that we enlisted for, striking a blow at our tyrannous enemy who sought to "hog the world", striking a blow for liberty and freedom, a blow which I trust will be strengthened by our thoughts of the loved ones we have left behind. The more I learn of the German the tighter I set my fist, the firmer I set my jaw, a determination takes possession of my body and mind which says "down with the brutes, never, no never will such beasts predominate over fair Canada, the home of my heart, a country which I am learning to appreciate by contrasting it with England, say nothing of Germany. We expect to leave in about five weeks. We will go into action shortly, if not immediately upon landing. A draft left here two weeks ago and they have been in action. I haven't had a line from Charles. I don't know whether he has crossed over or not. I got word from one of the boys and that they were attached to a working battalion, and that they were going up to repair some trenches. There isn't much danger for they work in the dark. We know less about the boys than you do, for as they shift we lose track of them but they keep writing home the news. Please send me Charles address, don't forget the number, if I had that I could get him.

The spring is coming on and the weather is quite moderate now. We had five weeks of real Canadian weather. Plenty of mud, but mud is an old story to us of Walpole.

I suppose you wonder how we feel about going to the front. If it wasn't for our parents and dear ones we would care less, as it stands here is our case. We are facing a serious situation, the odds are pretty much on our side but it is just like a game of checkers, we have five and they have three, they have set two traps. If we let up for a moment on our diligence they have us, a miss move and the game will be a draw. We need every man, cartilage and every ounce of provision that is on the ground. This spring we will show old Fritz why we need them. We are going to bend his knees, if he doesn't do that we will break his back, God willing. If some of us do not return, despair not, Spartan parents that you are for freedom we are in God's care and it will be His gracious will, remember our Father is merciful and everything is done in mercy even though we cannot see it that way.

I count it a great honor to go to France for I know that I will be helping to make a prayer, that I have made day after day, come true. It is "Thy Kingdom Come". We are not fighting for greed of gold or a dominion, but for God, for King and for Country. If a man died a missionary in China, I am sure no one would count his life wasted, I trust we are doing as noble a work here. May God be very near to every mother who has a son here.

I am anxious to get to France, to hasten the end of the struggle, to send us flying home to open arms, to make tears of joy to hearts aching for their joy of life, to bring permanent peace to their war-stricken world. I am afraid I have written too much, but this Sunday morning my heart has gone back to a little school where I see some boys, boys who are dear to mothers and fathers and brothers and sisters, for them I feel, for I know they are more lonesome than we are in a way I pray that God will keep and comfort you all until we return.

"Be brave and play the game." That is the text he Captain preached on this morning, I send it to you.
