We must still Recruit

We ought not to deceive ourselves by the idea that the war is already won. While there are many hopeful signs, there is still a vast amount of heavy work to do before the needful end is reached. The following serious words are from a recent communication from England: "Some of our commanders incline towards the belief that Germany's coming repulse, however quickly followed up, may still necessitate a further Autumn and a Spring campaign in 1918 for the final blows. There must in their opinion be no weakening of recruiting enthusiasm in Canada. Many men will be wanted, they say. They must train now or they will never be of use. General Linsett, speaking when distributing prizes at a divisional boxing competition warned the soldiers that while Germany approaches the final round of the fight showing signs of exhaustion, boxers seemingly exhausted often have a big punch in reserve. Don't cease preparations, rather redouble them, is the army's message". When the end is within reach it means usually, that even greater effort than before must be put forth in order to finish the task at once. There is still much to do before Canada raises the 300,000 promised by Sir Robert Borden, and each county must do its share.

Instructions were issued for the mobilization of forty-eight city regiments under the new plan of militia reorganization.
