Letter from England

The following letter was received by Jas. Williamson, Corralbank, on Saturday last from one of his Scottish nieces. The news concerning his son, Pte. A. M. Williamson who was wounded at Vimy Ridge, will be of interest to many of our readers.

April 26, 1917.

My Dear Uncle James:

I thought you would like to hear that I went over to St. Albans yesterday to see Bert in the hospital as I happened luckily to be staying with friends not very far away.

I was glad to find him in very good spirits and looking very contented and comforted. He seems to be well looked after and has a nice nurse. I couldn't get him to tell me of anything he wanted, except perhaps, cigarettes. He says he is getting on well now, but it will be some time before his poor hands recover from their wounds. It is pitiful to see them all bandaged up but it is a mercy things are no worse as they easily might have been. You must feel glad and thankful that he is safely over on this side and out of the danger for the present.

I stayed as long as I could with him and we had such a cheery chat. I felt as if I knew him all my life, he didn't seem in the least bit like a stranger. I hope he will be able to get north to Abernethy soon as all the aunts and cousins will long to have him to give him some of the home comforts after all the suffering and hardships he has been through.

The food question here is getting very serious indeed and the papers to day talk of compulsory rationing in six weeks time if we don't eat less bread. What we are going to eat in place of bread I don't know. With best of love to all I am
