The County Council has been sidetracking Cayuga on the Good Roads question for years and they continue to do so. It was decided again that no good roads should be built, yet Galedonia will be connected up with the Hamilton stone road to the North. Dunnville has applied for and been granted \$2700 for paving one of their streets. This account was put through the county council at the last Corners the County Council says that no Corners the County Council says that no road work is to be done till after the war. One reason is that our own and district recyes are not as enthusiasic and insisten for road improvement as they might be and while the people of Moulton, Dunn and Walpole have stone roads to travel over, the rate payers here are busy pulling themselves out of the mud

Another reason is that there is a combination, political or otherwise, in the County Council which has been turning all good roads money Hagersville and Dunnville way for years. Whether the government has countenanced the grants to expenditures on the good roads system or not we do not know. But we do know that the expenditure has been made not for the good of the county but for the benefit of the municipalities who have re ceived it and to the detriment of others.

What should be done, and Cayuga representative should be the one to make the move, is to enter an action against the county, and take the case before the government good roads commission, to compel them to link up Cayuga with the system, and not only that but to have the County Council work out the good roads system along lines laid down by the comnission of stoning main highways rather than hubs radiating to a couple of muni cipalities to the detriment of the others.
