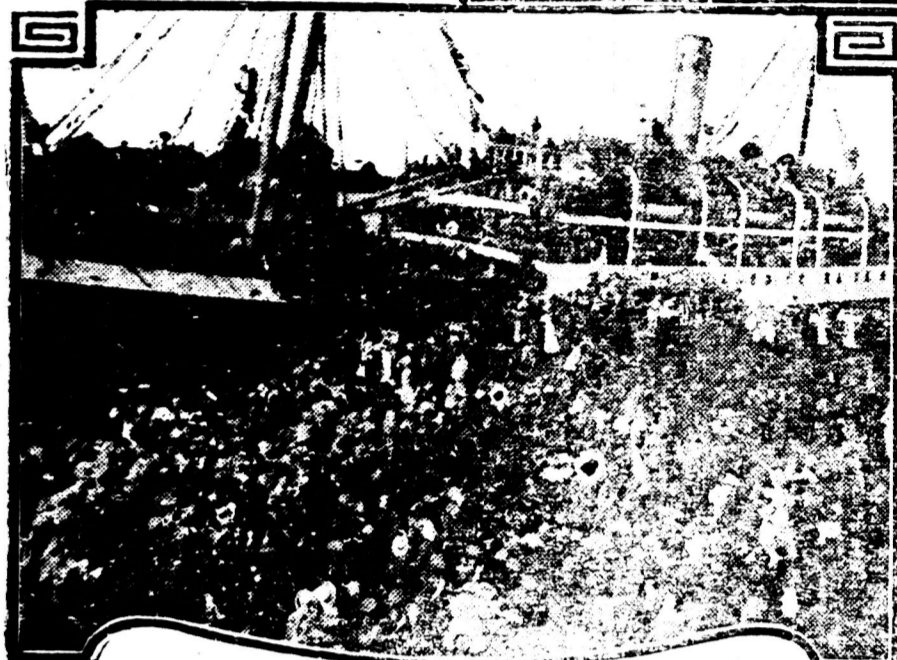


# The Home of Heroes

WHAT do you think of a city of 80,000 people—secure, serene, untroubled by the blue Pacific—that has sent 13,000 soldiers to the war for freedom, fully seventy-five per cent. of them her own native citizens? Victoria, British Columbia, has given units of every needed variety from grave bespectacled and bearded hospital to her latest unlicked bunch of bearcubs, the 142nd Bantams. But of all the famous regiments in Canada, not excepting even the Montreal Highlanders, nor the Queen's Own of Toronto, not one has outdistanced or can outdistance the record of Victoria's colored 58th Gordon Highlanders, which three months ago had 2,000 of all ranks to its credit.

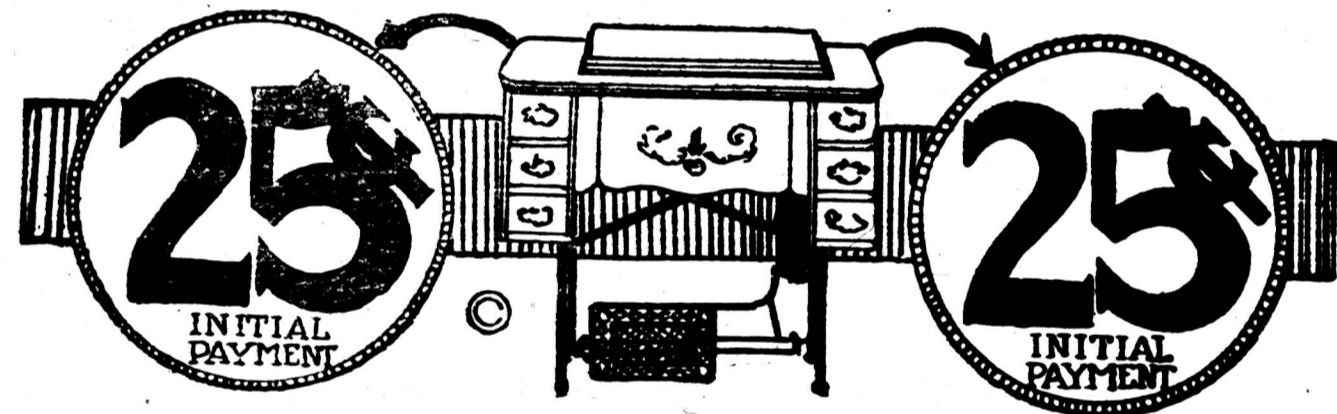
We can scarcely imagine the blithe carelessness with which the regiment
