The Liberal Candidate

Anyone who attended the Convention at Cayuga on Tuesday, the 13th, must have been pleased with J. J. Parsons, the Liberal standard bearer in the coming election. The meeting was packed to the doors with a representative Haldimand electorate; everybody there having a chance to express their opinions and many availed themselves of the opportunity. The result was that Mr. Parsons is more firmly than ever considered the man to-day in this county to lead those forces which stand to win the war and govern this nation as a constitutional democracy and not by the forced measures of a moribund parliament. No country can be rightly called a democracy unless the people of that country have a reasonable opportunity at times and all the time to express their approval or disapproval of the measures brought up by their elected representatives. It is only too apparent that the people of this country have had little chance to do anything, for some years back, but pay the bills, while scandal and profiteering have been rife from coast to coast. Partyism is the very life of government by the people. If a Union as now constituted, with a majority of the party in power and a few selected from the opposition, were to be returned and every candidate elected were to be a follower and supporter of that government, what would we have but a condition of one central power to rule over all, to beckon and command. This is the kind of thing we are fighting to put down in some countries.

The electors of this county are being asked to return to power and from this county a man who was a member of the late government at Ottawa, a man who has always been politically a dyed-in-the-wool partisan of that government, a man who from the campaigning platforms of this county habitually shouted to his hearers "We've got then (the Liberals) on the run." A man, if rumor and the talk of his friends are correct, was a pretty good observer of the wheat situation so that the consumer is stuck for a much excess cost and no help to the farmer. This kind of thing, if true, should not be continued at this time of war, especially by a self styled win-the-war candidate.

Canada's Victory Loan

\$150,000,000 5 1/2% Gold Bonds

Bearing interest from December 1st, 1917, and offered in three maturities, the choice of which is optional with the subscriber, as follows:

5 year Bonds due December 1st, 1922
10 year Bonds due December 1st, 1927
20 year Bonds due December 1st, 1937

This Loan is authorized under Act of the Parliament of Canada, and both principal and interest are a charge upon the Consolidated Revenue Fund. The amount of this issue is \$150,000,000, exclusive of the amount (if any) paid by the surrender of bonds of previous issues. The Minister of Finance reserves the right to allot the whole or any part of the amount subscribed in excess of \$150,000,000.

The Proceeds of this Loan will be used for War purposes only, and will be spent wholly in Canada.

Principal and Interest payable in Gold
Denominations: \$50, \$100, \$500 and \$1,000

Subscriptions must be in sums of \$50 or multiples thereof.

Principal payable without charge at the Office of the Minister of Finance and Receiver General at Ottawa, or at the Office of the Assistant Receiver General at Halifax, St. John, Charlottetown, Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg, Regina, Calgary and Victoria.

Interest payable, without charge, half-yearly, June 1st and December 1st, at any branch in Canada of any Chartered Bank.

Bearer or Registered Bonds

Bonds may be registered as to principal or as to principal and interest. Bearer bonds, when prepared, with coupons attached, payable to bearer, or registered as to principal, or for fully registered bonds when prepared, without coupons, in accordance with the application.

Delivery of interim certificates and of definitive bonds will be made through the Chartered Banks. Bearer bonds with coupons will be issued in denominations of \$50, \$100, \$500, and \$1,000, and may be registered as to principal only. Fully registered bonds, the interest on which is paid direct to the owner by Government cheque, will be issued in denominations of \$1,000, \$5,000, or any authorized multiple of \$5,000.

Subject to the payment of 25 cents for each new bond issued, holders of fully registered bonds without coupons, will have the right to convert into bonds of the denomination of \$1,000 with coupons, and holders of bonds with coupons will have the right to convert into fully registered bonds of authorized denominations without coupons, at any time, on application to the Minister of Finance.

Surrender of Bonds

Holders of Dominion of Canada Debenture Stock, due October 1st, 1919, and bonds of the three preceding Dominion of Canada War Loan Issues, have the privilege of surrendering their bonds in part payment for subscriptions to bonds of this issue, under the following conditions:

Debenture Stock, due October 1st, 1919, at Par and Accrued Interest.
War Loan Bonds, due December 1st, 1925, at 97 1/2% and Accrued Interest.
(The above will be accepted in part payment for bonds of any of the three maturities of this issue.)
War Loan Bonds, due October 1st, 1931, at 97 1/2% and Accrued Interest.
War Loan Bonds, due March 1st, 1937, at 96% and Accrued Interest.
(These will be accepted in part payment for bonds of the 1937 maturity ONLY of this issue.)

Bonds of the various maturities of this issue will, in the event of future issues of like maturity, or longer, made by the Government, other than issues made abroad, be accepted at par and accrued interest, as the equivalent of cash for the purpose of subscription to such issues.

Issue Price Par

Free from taxes—including any income tax—imposed in pursuance of legislation enacted by the Parliament of Canada.

Any branch in Canada of any Chartered Bank will forward subscriptions and issue provisional receipts.
