Nearly a Fatality

What might have proved a fatality occurred on Sunday last when the car of Mr. Neil Elliott, which was driven by his son, overturned with a car load on the corner of Main and Talbot streets. The party were on their way to early Morning Mass at St. Ann's Catholic church and owing to the slippery condition of the roads, the car skidded, hitting the curb and turned completely over. Luckily no one was injured, although the car was badly damaged.

Returned Hero

A returned hero in the person of Pte. Bert Williamson arrived in the village on Saturday night. Pte. Williamson was wounded at Vimy Ridge and has been in England since his injury; arriving in Canada some weeks ago. Pte. Williamson, whose wounds are of the hands and back, has been granted a release to work his father's farm. He is looking fine.

At Half Mast

Word was received yesterday that Pte. John Stengle had given his all for the cause he having "gone West," on Oct. 13. Pte. Stengle enlisted with the 80th Machine Gun Battalion at Hamilton, in the early winter of 1916, arriving in the trenches on October of the same year and he has been there continually. Jack, as he was usually called, is the only son of Mr. and Mrs. Wesley Stengle of this place. He received his education in the local school and of late he had been employed in Hamilton. He was a member of the Methodist church here and was honored and respected by all who knew him. His loss is to be regretted but his sacrifice enriched in that in doing his bit he furthered the cause for which the allied countries are fighting. His mother, father and sister survive him. The flag on the old Exchange Hotel is at half mast in reverence to sacrifice.

Killed in Action

Word was received on Saturday last that Pte. Willie Duff, son of Mr. and Mrs. David Duff, of Cayuga, had succumbed to wounds received in action. Bill, as he was commonly called, was well known in Jarvis, his father, at one time, being principal of the public school here. He enlisted with the 114th Haldimand battalion, going overseas with that unit. Before his enlistment he was employed in the bank at Cayuga. Those who remember Pte. Duff will regret the passing of so young a life but his sacrifice will be solace to his parents in that his was work well done.

Canada's Victory Loan

\$150,000,000 5 1/2% Gold Bonds

Bearing interest from December 1st, 1917, and offered in three maturities, the choice of which is optional with the subscriber, as follows:

5 year Bonds due December 1st, 1922
10 year Bonds due December 1st, 1927
20 year Bonds due December 1st, 1937

This Loan is authorized under Act of the Parliament of Canada, and both principal and interest are a charge upon the Consolidated Revenue Fund. The amount of this issue is \$150,000,000, exclusive of the amount (if any) paid by the surrender of bonds of previous issues.
