Henri Bendel, the Fifth Avenue couturier, writing in the December issue of Harper's Bazar, makes the following forecast:—

But now as a wartime economy women have gone to their treasure chests and brought out their old laces from their wrappings of blue tissue paper. In fact, these exquisite laces are being used so recklessly that, by the time Palm Beach days are here, we will find whole frocks made of real lace. And such a frock will be absolutely priceless—for it is doubtful if these wonderful bits of the past can ever be produced again, as the devastation of Belgium has all but destroyed the art."
