New Winnipeg Trains

Travel between Eastern and Western Canada is always heavy in the winter months, particularly during December with its holiday season. To meet the requirements of the public, therefore, a special service daily between Toionto and Winnipeg is announced by the Canadian Northern Railway; Westbound, Dec 3rd to Jan 2nd, 1918 only: Eastbound, Dec. lst to Jan. 5th 1918 only. Thereafter regular tri-weekly service will be resumed. A through Tourist Sleeping Car will also be operated daily between Toronto and Calgary as part of the above special service, and connection will be made with regular daily trains between Winnipeg and Edmonton. Service between Toronto and Vancouver will remain tri-weekly, leaving Toronto Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, as at present.

intsituted by the British Government all parcels from Canada to Officer Prisoners of War interned in Germany or Austria-Hungary containing foodstuffs, on and after January 1st, 1918, can only be aceptel for onward transmission by the Postal Service if they bear a "coupon" issuad by the Prisouers of War Depart. ment, Canadian Red Cross Society, London, England.

Inder the new arrangement the amount of fookstuffs which may be sent to an Officer Prisoner of War during four weeks must not exceed one hundred pounds. Of this total the Prisoner of War Department of the Canadian Red Cross will send to each interned Canadian Officer including those attached to other Canadian units not less than six ten sound parcels each four weeks. The remaining forty pounds of foodstuffs per four weeks may be sent personally by relatives in Canada, but each parcel must bear a coupon which can be obtained on application from the Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Socie y, London, England.

The right to send food parcels to an Officer Frisone: of War rests with the next of kin, but may be transferred by the latter or by the Prisoner of War himself to any person. It is advisable that application should be made to the Prisoner of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Society, London, England, for the necessary conpons for parcels packed personally at the earliest possible moment.

These compons are to be used on food parcels only and no coupons can be issued for amounts under ten pounds. If, there fore, it is desired to despatch a pancel weighing less than ten pounds an ordinary coupon must be used and the parcel counts as one of the four permissible in four weeks.

for enclosure in any parcel despatched under the Red Cross tabel. The importance of guarding against any misuse of the label cannot be too strongly empha sized. Such action would not only harm the Prisoner to whom the parcel was ad dressed but would ract on other Prison ers and might endanger the whole system of despatching the food supplies to Ufficers and men who have fallen into the hands of the enemy.

and Turkey come under the new scheme. Owing, bowever, to the difficulties of postal communication, it is not advisable to send many parcels to officers in Turkish camps. Supplies can be purchased in friends around Renton the fore part in Asia Minor and it is better to remit money to the Prisoner rather than se many parcels.

This new scheme relates only to parcels containing foodstuffs for Officer Prisoners of War interned in enemy countries and does not affect in any way the present regulations governing the transmission of parcel to Prisoners of War other than Officers, which regulations remain un-


