Magistrate Ball, of Woodstock, has levied fines amounting to \$2,406 during the first year of the Ontario Temperance Act. This large amount is wholly due to severe penalties imposed as the number of cases tried are less than 50 per cent of the number for the previous year.

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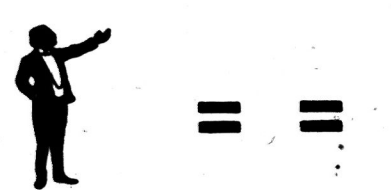
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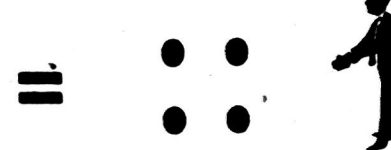
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
