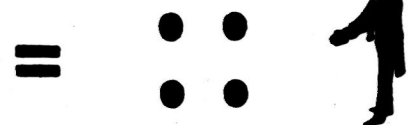

OBITUARY

Millenbacher

The sudden death of Mr. Benjamin Millenbacher, one of the village's oldest and most respected residents, on Tuesday evening at a late hour, cast a deep gloom over the residents when the news became known this morning.

Contracting a severe cold a week ago last Thursday, his health gradually declined until last Friday he was forced to take to his bed. Pneumonia set in, which, combined with a weakened constitution, due to a serious illness some nine months ago, proved too much and he passed away at eleven o'clock last night. He was born in the township of Rainham, January 18, 1838, and was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Charles Millenbacher of that Township. He spent his early life in that vicinity, moving to Jarvis some forty years ago, where he has been in the jewelry business continually during his residence here.

On September 1, 1868, he was united in marriage to Miss Julia Ann Buck, who predeceased him some four years ago. Five children were given to the union: namely: Mrs. Jno. Porter, of this place, Chris, of Charlotte, Mich.; Mrs. Robert Hinchcliffe, of Troy, Mich.; Gordon, of Fort Saskatchewan, Alta.; and Mrs. W. R. Hinchcliffe, of Milwaukee, Wis.

Some three years ago he was united in marriage to Miss Emma Ashbaugh who survives him.

The late Mr. Millenbacher will be greatly missed by the residents of Jarvis and vicinity and his generosity will be remembered by them when his other characteristics will have been forgotten.

The bereaved family have the sympathy of the whole community in their sad bereavement.

The funeral will take place on Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock, service at the house and interment in the Methodist church cemetery.

Elliott

The death of Mr. Thos. Elliott occurred with startling suddenness at the home of his brother on Thursday last. Taken suddenly ill he expired shortly after medical aid reached him, the cause of his death being heart failure.

The late Thos. Elliott, who was 61 years old, was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Elliott, of Woodhouse, and spent the early part of his life in this vicinity. Later he worked in different parts finally settling in Detroit some twelve years ago. At the time of his death he was on a visit to his brother Neal and renewing old acquaintances.

The funeral took place on Saturday morning last leaving the home of Mr. N. Elliott at nine o'clock and proceeding to St. Ann's church, Walpole, for service and interment.

Anthrax Outbreak

Rainham Township has an outbreak of Anthrax and a couple of farmers there, Chas. Schweyer and his neighbor Fred Helka, have lost about a dozen head from the disease for which there is no cure.

A couple of years ago Seneca Township was visited and many valuable cattle was lost. The disease was at that time traced to the Reserve. But where the present outbreak originated is hard to discover. Possibly some beast has become infected with the disease and after death proper care of the disposal of the carcass has not been taken and the germs have been carried in the air.

The Department of Agriculture supplies an antitoxin at 5 cents a dose and an instrument to administer the same at 75c, and farmers who have not already called in a vet to do the work should get in touch with the Department in Cayuga at once. An ounce of prevention may be worth several hundred dollars in these days of the high price of beef.—Advocate.

Letters From England.

Whitley, Eng., Sept. 19/17-
Dear Mrs. Sanders:

Just a few lines to let you know that I have just received the box you gave to the Red Cross to send to the lads in khaki. I see by the note that you sent them Feb. 22nd and as they only arrived here a week ago you will see they were delayed for some time.

I most certainly am grateful for them and I wish to thank you to the utmost. They just fit me dandy and I am glad I was the luck one to get them.

I am one of the original 125th from Brantford and to date have been in England 19 months. I long to get to France but being a signaller have been kept behind in the hopes that Canada would have a fifth division to staff the Hun.

The weather here for the past few days has been terribly wet, raining continually since Monday noon. To-day has been so wet that we could not drill [and] as a big Canadian Mail arrived at noon I am using the time to write and answer letters.

We go out on bivouacs and have no tents, stay out for a week in sunshine or rain and then march back to our camp. In all it is not a life of ease but then in balance it has many more good points for it than against it.
