### County Council

CAYUGA, Oct. 16, 1917.

Council met pursuant to adjournment. The Warden in the chair. All members present except Wm. Smithers.

Smelcer-Andrews—That we resume business with the Warden in the chair. Minutes of last meeting were then read.

Hart-Clark—That the minutes as read be adopted.

The following communications were then read:

Dr. Board, of the Railway commissions re protection at level crossing.

Dr. Albert Harris, claiming damages.

Roulston-Pyle—That Messrs. Smith, Clark and Smelcer be a committee to draft a by-law relating to the disposal of weed seeds from the seed cleaning plants of the county. Carried.

Pyle-Roulston—That Messrs. Clark, Stewart and Smelcer be a committee to deal with the communication. Carried.

Swale-Bradford—That this council do now adjourn to allow the different committees to meet. Carried.

Bradford-Sawle—That the Council resume business with the Warden in the Chair. Carried.

Smith Roulston—That the sum of two thousand dollars be granted to the National Council of Young Men's Christian Association of Canada, and that a by-law be prepared and the bill read a first time. Carried.

Sawle-Smith—That the usual annual grant of \$50 be made to each Agricultural Society in the county, and that the same be paid by the Treasurer on a certificate of the Secretary, that an agricultural exhibition was held during the year 1917. Carried.

Pyle-Roulston—That the report of the special committee on communications be received and read. Carried.

Cayuga, Oct. 18, 1917.

To the Warden and Members of County Council.

We, your Special Committee on Communications, beg leave to report as follows:

Re communication from Henry Carter regarding the excavation under the fence adjoining the quarry; we recommend that it be referred to the Good Roads committee.

Re committee from Albert Harris regarding repairs to autos; that this be referred to the Good Roads committee.

Re communication from the Board of Railway Commissioners; we recommend that this be brought before a committee of the whole council.

Simenton-Smelcer—That the report of the Road and Bridge committee be received and read. Carried.

To Warden and Members of the County Council.

Gentlemen—We, your Road and Bridge committee beg leave to report as follows:

1. That the account of James McAlpine for \$480 for an approach on the Caledonia bridge be paid.

2. That R. Warner for repairing a hole in the Selkirk bridge amounting to 50 cents be paid.

Bradford-Lyons—That the report of the Road and Bridge Committee be adopted as read. Carried.

Pyle-Sawle—Resolved, that Levi Werner, as Treasurer, is hereby authorized for and in the name of the County of Haldimand, to draw, accept, sign and make all or any cheques and orders for the payment of money, to pay and receive all moneys, and to give acquaintance for the same from the Canadian Bank of Commerce, and generally for and in the name and on behalf of the said County to transact any business he may think fit.

Also, that Levi Werner, as Treasurer, or any one of them, be and is hereby authorized on behalf of the County to negotiate with, deposit with, or transfer to the said bank (but for the credit of the said County account only) all or any bills of exchange, promissory notes, cheques or orders for the payment of money and other negotiable paper, and for the said purpose to endorse the same or any of them on behalf of the said County; also from time to time to arrange, settle, balance and certify all books and accounts between the said County and the Bank, and to receive all paid cheques and vouchers, and to sign the Bank's forms of settlement of balances and releases. Carried.

Roulston-Pyle—That the report of the Home committee be received and read. Carried.

Cayuga, Oct. 18, 1917.

To the Warden and Members of County Council:

Gentlemen—We your Home Committee, beg leave to submit the following report: There are 39 inmates in the Home—18 males and 21 females—1 more than in our last report. Miss Grace Smart, of Caledonia, has been admitted to the Home having been committed by H. B. Sawle, reeve of Caledonia. Received a cheque of \$10 from J. W. Sheppard for damage done to the barn by lightning on Sept. 2, and handed the cheque to L. Werner, County treasurer. We find everything in and around the Home in a very satisfactory condition. We have carefully examined the vouchers of the different accounts for maintenance, compared them with the accounts and find them correct. We would refer the same to the Finance Committee for payment.

Cayuga, Oct. 18, 1917.

To the Warden and Members of County Council:

Gentlemen—We, your County Roads committee beg leave to report as follows:

1. That we have examined accounts presented by the Superintendent and recommended them for payment.

2. On Division 23, between the Village of Caledonia and the County of Wentworth, on the 25th of this month we expect to have approximately one mile of road finished, metalling. If conditions are favorable we hope to be able to complete another half mile.

3. We are still repairing the macadam sections of Divisions 39 and 40. We expected to have this work done about the middle of October, but was held up waiting for stone.

4. Received from Stanley Shupe, County Engineer, a cheque for \$4 for two yards of stone furnished the town of Dunnville. The cheque was handed to the Treasurer.

5. The "Barker" award, ditch on Division 19. Our portion of the work is completed.

6. We are having an experienced foreman and helper going over our bridges and culverts making necessary repairs, and hope before the season closes to have them all gone over.

Would recommend that 6 feet of land be purchased along the east side of Byng quarry from H. Carter of Dunn township. The price, \$25, agreement is hereby attached.

Would recommend that the account of Albert E. Harris for damages to his auto on division 22, amounting to \$9.15, be paid.

REPORT OF BUILDING COMMITTEE

Cayuga, Oct. 18, 1917

To the Warden and Members of the County Council:

We, your Building committee, beg leave to report as follows:

1. We recommend the account of A. J. Grant for material in goal residence, amounting to \$54.41, be paid; also the county to get a rebate of \$8 from Judge Hopkins.

2. We recommend the account of G. Herod for 87 hours' labor at 60 cents per hour, amounting to \$52.20, be paid.

3. The Building committee met re water supply for the county buildings and measured the ground for water line most satisfactory for water pressure at a distance of 700 feet, the water pipe to be laid at a constant depth of 4 feet underground. Owing to the scarcity of day laborers the contract for furnishing pipe and all connections for said line was let to Murray and Son, Cayuga, 1 1/2 inch water pipe with long collars at 25 cents per foot, they, they to complete the whole line satisfactory to the committee at a cost of \$400, and that M. G. Hart be appointed to oversee the work.

4. We recommend that a gas stove be installed in the vault in J. B. Eccles' office.

5. We also recommend that Thomas Walsh be granted the sum of \$25 for services rendered overseeing the work on the jailor's residence.
