## Thanksgiving Day.

Ottawa, Sept. 11.—There is a peculiar confusion as to the date of Thanksgiving day. It has been fixed for Monday, Oct. 8; not Monday, Oct. 1.

The error in the announcement arose from different officials in the state department giving out different dates for the festival. Oct. 8 is the proper date.

A publication which should prove of considerable interest to the prospective settler to Western Canada has just been issued by the Natural Resources Intelligence Branch of the department of the Interior. It is known as the "Homestead" Map and shows graphically the exact location of each quarter-section which is still available for entry under the free Government offer of 160 acres.

The Map has been published in four separate sheets, one each for Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Northern and Southern Alberta, respectively, and is available for free distribution in individual sheets or in complete sets.

The Homestead Map is one of a number of maps, reports and bulletins with respect to settlement in Western Canada that are available for free distribution upon application to the Natural Resources Intelligence Branch. In view of the arrangement with respect to farm labour in Western Canada counting as residence on a homestead and thereby reducing the period within which residence and cultivation duties must be performed prior to applying for a title to the land, also on account of the impetus which has been given to Agriculture by the present world shortage of foodstuffs, the demand for information on the subject of homesteading is showing a marked increase.

## Backheat Screenings for Poultry and Swine

A car of this feed was purchased by the Poultry Division, Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, through the Superintendent of the Government Terminal Elevators, Fort William. The car contained 20 tons, costing \$30 F. O. B. Fort William and \$35 per F. O. B. Ottawa—\$1.75 per cwt. Of this, fifteen tons were whole and five tons ground fine.

On receipt, it was fed to all classes of poultry old and young, the grain in hoppers and the mash in hoppers or in moist mash. The birds after eating a corn and meat diet did not take to the whole screenings for several feeds, but the mash was readily taken from the start. When the grain was fed in large quantities the wheat was picked out, and a little care had to be taken in order to have them eat everything up clean. Now after three week's feeding, everything is eaten up except a few oat hulls.

A test was made on 200 pullets from 2 to 4 months of age. In twenty days they ate 516 pounds of grain and 204.5 lbs. of mash. The total gain was 152.6 lbs., i. e. it took 4.7 lbs. of the feed to make one lb. of gain at a cost of 9.2 cents.

Dr. Shutt, Dominion Oremist, has submitted an analysis of this product from which we quote:—This product, it will be seen, consists approximately 50 p. c. wheat, 40 p. c. wild buckwheat, 2.5 p. c. light oats, 1 p. c. flax seed, 4 p. c. weed seeds, 5.7 p. c. chaff, hulls, etc. The chemical analysis of the ground mash is water 14.07, protein 11.84, fat 2.97, carbohydrates 64.53, fibre 5.36, ash 2.13

E. S. Archibald, Dominion Animal Husbandman, reports that buckwheat screenings as a food for swine of all ages is very valuable. For finishing and young growing hogs well ground buck-wheat screenings will produce as great gains as will a mixture of wheat shorts three parts, fine ground corn three parts, linseed oil meal one part. This latter mixture at present prices is worth fifty-four dollars per ton on eastern markets.

The above prices were for a car lot and prices for smaller quantities would be considerably higher. It is suggested that a number of poultry or swine breeders in a locality club together to order a car. It is a good purchase at a figure near the above price.

## Canned Goods Banned

Whereas, the Food Controller for Canada submits that he is advised that the canners of the Dominion of Canada are not able to supply the demand for canned vegetables for the coming season; that there will be a great supply of fresh vegetables on the market, and that an embargo upon the use of canned vegetables would work no hardships on the consumer while green and fresh vegetables are available and would stimulate the consumption of fresh vegetables, making a market for same, and also conserving the supply of canned goods for later use.

Therefore His Excellency the Governor General in Council, under and in virtue of the provisions of the War Measure Act, 1914, is pleased to make the following regulations and the same are hereby made and enacted accordingly:

1. On and after the twenty-fourth day of August, 1917, and until further notice, except as hereafter provided, the sale and purchase of peas, beans, tomatoes, beets, celery, corn, spinach, rhubarb and pumpkins, preserved in cans, glass jars, or any other container, commonly known as "canned vegetables", is prohibited.

2. The above regulations shall not apply:

(a) When such vegetables are sold by the manufacturer to the wholesaler, jobber or retailer; or by the wholesaler or jobber to the retailer; or

(b) When such vegetables are to be consumed in the lumber camps, mining camps, construction camps, and dining cars, provided that they will be consumed within said lumber camps, mining camps, construction camps and dining cars, and not resold.

(c) When such vegetables form a part of the contents of a can, glass jar, bottle or other container and are sold as soups, oatmeal or pickles.

4. It is provided, however, that the Food Controller for Canada may issue licenses permitting the sale and consumption of said canned vegetables as he deems necessary or expedient.
