13-6-17.

To Misses Simons:  
Dear Friend:—

I take great pleasure in writing a few lines to you trusting they will find you as well as I am at present and also many thanks for the pair of socks that I received in the parcel from the Jarvis Ladies' Institute. It is very kind of the ladies of Canada to think of the boys in France. I am sure they are all proud to be able to say they belong to Canada or are in the Canadian army. Of course we all wish we were back, especially at times when chances look small of ever getting back. But thank God when things look the blackest and one feels like giving up all hope its then that he turns his thoughts to home and those he left, and with those thoughts he loses himself and fights the harder knowing that its not altogether for himself as fighting but for those he knows and left at home that can't fight for themself.

Dear friend, perhaps you do not know me personally but I will tell where I lived in Canada. Just three miles south of Jarvis at Mr. R. Parkinson. Perhaps you know them as I think you would, seeing they have lived near Jarvis all their lives. I am glad to say that they treated me well, being with them only 2 years and I'm sure if ever I come back to Canada Jarvis is where I'll land.

Well, I think I'll have to close for this time, trusting the war will soon be over and the boys all back safe. I remain

## Sudden Death at Amelia

The sudden death of Florence Beatrice Peacock, wife of Mr. George Peacock, took place early on Thursday morning last, August 16, 1917, at Amelia. The deceased was taken suddenly ill on the evening of the 15th and Dr. F. J. Stewart, of Eastend, was called, but medical aid was of no avail, death being due to heart failure.

The funeral took place at Amelia on Friday afternoon, the service being conducted by the Rev. A. M. T. Dainty, (Vicar of Eastend) and a large number attended the last sad ceremony, as both the deceased and the bereaved husband were well and popularly known in the vicinity.

Mr. and Mrs. Peacock came to the Amelia district on the 23rd July, 1915, from Calgary where they had been married but a short time before. They engaged in farming and the deceased lady became very popular in the district as she was generous to a fault and all who called were sure of being treated with open handed hospitality. She was of an affectionate disposition, bright and winning in ways so that friendships circle was to her a large one. Indeed it may be said of her that 'none knew her but to love her.'

There is left to mourn her loss the bereaved husband, a sister in British Columbia and a brother and sister in Calgary, and to these sincerest sympathy is extended.—The East End Enterprise.

## Military Tribunals for Haldimand

His Honor Judge Hopkins received word from the Deputy Minister of Justice E. L. Newcombe, at Ottawa, stating that the Military Tribunals under the Military Service Act 1917, will be established at the following points in the County of Haldimand, one in each, Cayuga, Caledonia, Jarvis and Dunnville. The tribunals are also empowered to sit at other places with in the judicial district to suit public convenience. The word also states that the members must be nominated as soon as possible. Judge Hopkins appointed that acting on instructions the appointees have already been nominated. [The court will consist of two members, the county judge being the head and the other to be selected by a board of selection, to be established by the Senate and the House of Commons. His Honor has appointed the following persons to act on the Exemption Boards under the Military Service Act.

## Poultry Diet

There is an article of diet of which there are large stocks in storage in Canada and for which there has been practically no demand. This commodity is frozen poultry.

This unusual situation this year has been caused through the shortage of ocean tonnage. A large part of the stocks on hand had been sold for export but could not be transported owing to the unavailability of refrigerated space.

Canadian consumers, in the past, have not taken kindly to frozen meats. This has been due, in part at least, to lack of suitable facilities for defrosting, which if not properly done results in the meat being discolored and unattractive. The time, has arrived, however, when it may be necessary for consumers to rely more and more upon frozen meat products. In times of scarcity every advantage should be taken of the facilities provided to carry over the surplus from one season to the shortage of another. Properly defrosted poultry, for instance, is equally as wholesome and nutritious as fresh-killed stock.

The public is invited, therefore, to ask for frozen poultry, of which there is a large supply consisting of chickens, broilers, ducks, geese and turkeys. The trade advice that many of these varieties can be obtained at prices considerably lower than those prevailing for fresh killed stock at present available.

It is given as a suggestion that frozen poultry could be utilized economically as a substitute for beef and bacon on Tuesdays and Fridays. If special poultry or frozen meats were arranged and individual retailers had prospects of handling a certain quantity, they could order accordingly and all arrangements be made for the necessary defrosting. As there is practically no other market for frozen poultry at the present time, it would appear to be of distinct advantage to this country, in assisting to conserve its food products of other sorts, that poultry meat be utilized, insofar as possible, in the way suggested.
