REPORT OF HOME COMMITTEE

To the Warden and Members of the County Council:
Gentlemen—We, your Home Committee, beg leave to submit the following report: There are 59 inmates in the Home—13 males and 11 females—1 less than in our last report. Mrs. McFadden of Cayuga has been discharged at the request of Mr. Lishman, Reeve of Cayuga. On Sunday morning, the 2nd inst., the barn was struck by lightning and have reported the loss to Mr. Sheppard. We have carefully examined the vouchers of the different accounts for maintenance, compared them with the accounts and find them correct. We would refer the same to the Finance Committee for payment.

Cayuga, Sept. 11, 1917.

To the Warden and Members of County Council.

Gentlemen—We, your Roads committee beg leave to report as follows:

First—That we have examined the accounts for the construction and maintenance presented by the Superintendent, and recommend them for payment.

Second—All the macadam sections of the county road system have been repaired, excepting divisions 39 and 40, known as the Forks road. This we hope to have repaired not later than October 15.

Third—We stopped grading on September 1 for this season, but a number of the main roads have been badly worked up by automobiles and steam tractors and will have to be gone over with the grader and tractor to put them in good condition again.

Fourth—The macadam road which we are constructing between the village of Caledonia and the county of Wentworth we regret that we are not getting along as fast with this work as we would like, owing to the railway not supplying cars for stone. A better service is promised and we are hopeful conditions will improve.

Fifth—The expenditure up to Sept. 1, 1917, for maintenance and repair on the whole system of 125 miles is \$11,495.44.

Sixth—The expenditure up to Sept. 1, 1917, for construction is \$3,672.16.

Seventh—That no action be taken re Joseph Oberman's claim for damage on division 18.

Eighth—That the claim of James Douglas for an accident on division 22, amounting to \$4.59, be paid.

Ninth—That Albert Schurr be given the use of the gasoline tractor for threshing purposes at \$4 per day, to be computed from the date he receives the tractor until he delivers it back again. He is also to repair any breakages and return the tractor in as good condition as he received it.

Tenth—That Mr. Bain and Mr. Pyle be a committee to investigate conditions at the Byng quarry.

Eleven—That the Superintendent notify the corporation of Cayuga that we want the crushing outfit which they rented from us last season returned to the Dennis quarry not later than October 1, 1917.

Twelfth—That the Warden and Mr. Sawle be a committee to interview the Grand Trunk Railway and Canada Crushed Stone Corporation, Ltd., of Dundas, re deliveries of Stone to Caledonia for metalling Division 23, and also to assist the Superintendent in getting the best possible service.
