Latin American Countries Should Be Great Furniture Lands.

No other countries on the face of the earth possess such wonderful forests of valuable woods as do those comprising the Latin-American group, writes W. E. Tugenbaugh in Lesile's. In every/republic of the West Indies. Central and South America, one may find cabinet woods, building woods, medicinal woods, dyewoods, aromatic woods and trees yielding resinous gums. In Hayti and Santo Domingo, as well as in other nearby localities. may be encountered a tree producing a cotton much in demand among uphoisterers and mattress-makers, and extensively employed as a stuffing for life preservers. The rubber tree is in a class by itself, and in the interior of Brazil, Bolivia. Venezuela, Peru, Ecuador and Colombia are primeval forests of this twentieth century necessity. Among the Indians and the lower class of natives the bamboo, of which there are many varieties, is a necessary, for it gives them household utensils and other useful articles.

The tropical fruit trees that exist in these lands are numerous, and I cannot recall one fruit that is not really delicious. Unfortunately, however, they are rather delicate and cannot stand rough handling or transportation. Indeed, some of the natives sert that many of their most excellen: fruits are ripe and fit to eat for only short periods of time. No attempt is made to develop crehards or these trees, as we do in this country, for the reason that the demand is entirely local. They could, however, be made into excellent jams, jellies and preserves, and the fact that in practically all these countries the sugar cane flourishes and crude sugar for this purpose could be had very chear. would, it seems to me, warrant some of our progressive manufacturers in looking into the problem, / for the time is rapidly approaching when the United tates cannot supply the requirements for such staples.

Of the resin-producing trees two are really "amous, namely, the one yielding chicle, and the other giving balsam of Peru. Without the chicle tree. to be found chiefly in Southern Mexico, Guatemala and some near-by Central American countries, chewing gum could not be made. Due to American. energy, this has developed into a wonderful industry in the countries to which the tree is indigenous. Balsam of Peru grows only in Salvador, and in that country along a imited strip of used extensively in medicine.
