The Manufacture of Cream Cheese

(Experimental Farm Notes.)

At some time or other during their career, most dairy farmers have experienced difficulty in marketing their produce satisfactorily. The trouble may have been because of a poor demand for the product, or the quality may have been below standard.

The dairy produce from the Experimental Farm, Agassiz, B. C., has been sold in a number of different ways, one of the ways, one of the most satisfactory of which is in the form of cream cheese. The cream cheese appears to be the most popular soft cheese. It is easily made on the farm and requires very little special apparatus. The labour and cost of making and packing are small, so that the manufacture is well suited for any producer within a reasonable distance from a market. It is a suitable and remunerative method of marketing cream. During cool weather we have been able to keep this cheese for a week or ten days without any appreciable deterioration in flavor, but, as evaporation is going on continually, the cheese, unless originally made over-weight, will not be up to the standard weight at the end of this time. It is therefore advisable to place it on the market as soon as possible after completion.

The market as yet is limited but the demand appears to be increasing. We have sold during the past twelve months 5,420 of these cheeses in the city of Vancouver. The wholesale price obtained is 15¢ each, which amounts to \$813 for the product during the past year. Each cheese weighs six ounces and approximately ten dozen are now being manufactured weekly from 170 pounds of 12% cream. This brings a return of sixty cents per pound butterfat for the cream, with the whey retained for feeding purposes.

The shape of the cheese is cylindrical from one to one and a half inches deep in diameter. When moulding, the cheese is pressed into a cheesecloth cover and when ready for shipment is increased in a neat cardboard carton. It is a cheap cheese and a convenient size for table use. Picnicers have found it a suitable substitute for meat as a filling for sandwiches. It is also found to be very delicious and palatable when served with lettuce, celery or any of the various kinds of vegetable salad.

A By-Law to provide for the taking of Votes of the Electors on a proposed By-Law entitled "A By-Law to grant certain privileges and franchises to the Dominion Natural Gas Company Limited."

WHEREAS a proposed By-Law of the Corporation of the Village of Jarvis entitled "A By-Law to grant certain privileges and franchises to the Dominion Natural Gas Company Limited" requires for its validity the assent of the Electors and it is expedient and necessary to pass this By-Law for the purpose proposed.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Village of Jarvis that the By-Law entitled "A By-Law to grant certain privileges and franchises to the Dominion Natural Gas Company Limited" be and the same shall be in full force and effect from and after the passing of this By-Law.

POLLING PLACE—Temperance Hall, Peel Street.

POLLING SUB-DIV.—Nov. 1; DEPUTY RETURNING OFFICER—Andrew Rodgers.

1. On the Twenty-third day of April, A. D., 1918, at the hour of 10 o'clock in the forenoon the head of the Council of the said Corporation or some member of the said Council appointed for that purpose by resolution of the said Council Chamber in said Municipality for the purpose of appointing and if requested so to do shall appoint by writing signed by him, two persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes by the said polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and promoting the proposed By-Law on the Twenty-sixth day of April, A. D., 1918, at the hour of 10 o'clock in the forenoon at the Council Chamber in said Municipality. The Clerk of the said Municipality shall attend and sum up the votes given for and against the proposed By-Law.

By-Law No.

A BY-LAW TO GRANT CERTAIN PRIVILEGES AND FRANCHISES TO THE DOMINION NATURAL GAS COMPANY, LTD.

WHEREAS the Dominion Natural Gas Company, Limited (hereinafter called "The Company") is a duly incorporated company, carrying on the business of the production, sale and distribution of natural gas, and is desirous of furnishing natural gas within the Municipality of the Village of Jarvis (hereinafter called "The Corporation") for the purposes of light, heat and power, and it is expedient to grant the request of the said Company, subject to the conditions hereinafter set forth.

AND WHEREAS the granting of the rights, privileges and franchises to the said Company, upon the terms and conditions hereinafter provided for and set forth, has been duly assented to by the Municipal Electors of the Village of Jarvis, as provided by the Municipal Act with respect to by-laws requiring the assent of the electors.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Village of Jarvis as follows:

1. The word "Street" and "Streets" where used in this By-law shall be deemed to include the squares, highways, lanes and public places of the said Village of Jarvis.

2. The Dominion Natural Gas Company, Limited, its successors and assignees are hereby authorized and empowered to construct, maintain, complete, and operate works and continue to operate its present system within the Village of Jarvis, for the production, sale and distribution of natural gas for the purposes of light, heat and power within and through the limits of the said Village of Jarvis and to conduct such gas for the purposes aforesaid through, under and along the streets, highways and public places of the Village of Jarvis by means of mains, pipes and conduits for a period of twenty-five years from the passing of this By-law subject to the terms, conditions and stipulations hereinafter mentioned.

3. All appliances provided by the said Company for the distribution of gas through such mains, pipes and conduits within the limits of the said Village shall be suitable, proper and sufficient and shall also comply with all regulations, restrictions and conditions which may from time to time be made or imposed by the Fire Underwriters' Association of Canada or any similar association or body from time to time regulating the rates of fire insurance or regulating the distribution of natural gas within the limits of the said Village.

4. The Company may break up, dig and trench such streets and so many of the streets of the said Village of Jarvis as may be necessary for laying down mains, pipes and conduits and other works to conduct the natural gas to the consumers thereof or for taking up, altering, renewing or repairing the same when the Company shall deem expedient doing, and taking care to preserve the free and uninterrupted passage through said streets while such works are in progress and finishing said works and placing the streets in as good condition as before the commencement of the said work and without any unnecessary delay.

(a) In the prosecution of the work of opening up any street in the said Village of Jarvis the said Company will not obstruct, molest, damage, or interfere with any of the gutters, drains, sewers, water pipes, watercourses, conduits or other works belonging to the Corporation now existing or hereafter constructed, but will use all proper measures to protect the same and leave them in as good condition as they were immediately prior to the prosecution of such work using due and proper diligence in so doing.

(b) The Company shall erect suitable and sufficient barriers and place proper and sufficient lights around all excavations made by it in the prosecution of such work to prevent accidents to all persons, animals and vehicles using the said streets.

(c) Where excavations are made or paving, planking, macadam or granolithic is removed in the prosecution of the work of opening up any street in the said Village of Jarvis, the Company shall when back-filling ram the earth ever necessary to do so, so as to obtain the greatest compactness, and when paving, planking, macadam or granolithic is removed as aforesaid the same shall be relaid and replaced by it with the same kind of material and in the same manner as before the removal thereof, and when such excavations are filled in and the work completed it will restore any and all streets in which it may lay pipes to as good condition as they were before the laying and use of such pipes, provided always that if after they have filled up such excavation and relaid and replaced such macadam or granolithic the surface of the street, the Company shall fill up such excavation to the level of such street and take up and relay such paving, planking, macadam, or granolithic to the proper level thereof.

(d) The Company shall without delay clear the said streets of all dirt or rubbish caused by or resulting from the laying of mains, conduits and pipes or the making of any trenches or excavations or in the performance of any works done by it incidental to the powers hereby conferred.

(e) Whenever the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Village of Jarvis shall determine to construct any sewer, drain or ditch or any

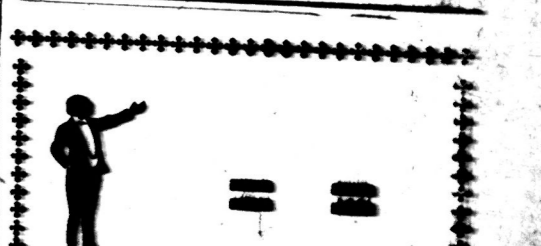
