The Gas Question

The Gas question continues to occupy the attention of the citizens of the village and from time warm to sizzling hot the talk rebounds from one end of the community to the other and even spreading into the Township. Not content with what opinion was found in the village a few of the village delegates G. L. Miller to interview Mr. Thurston, a lawyer who is employed by the Railway Board, of Toronto. The contents of the letter in regard to the interview arrived on Saturday and the same was found to be against the new By-law. The members of the Council, with the exception of Richard Walker, on learning such was the case, despatched R. W. Smith, Reeve, for the opinion of the Editor of the Municipal World, at St. Thomas, a man whose opinion is sought after all over the Dominion on Municipal matters. The letter arriving a public meeting was called for Tuesday night to discuss matters. The attendance was poor, considering the importance of the question. Mr. Agar, of Simcoe, a member of the firm of Slaght, Slaght & Agar, was the main speaker of the evening, he showed why the new By-law was in advance of that of the Township. Every part of the By-Laws, which are in dispute, was dissected. Mr. Agar even giving the stand of the government as well as the Gas company. Both letters were read and commented upon. At the conclusion of the remarks Messrs. Dr. Howell and Walter occupied the platform and many were the points brought out against the By-Law, the same being answered by the lawyer in question. The meeting broke up at the midnight hour.

Brooding Methods

(Experimental Farm Note)
If less than that 100 chicks are to be brooded the old natural means will answer if more, the artificial means are to be preferred.

NATURAL BROODING
Some hens never make good mothers. If the setting hen is not suitable, transfer some of the eggs before hatching to one that is, if you like.

FREE FROM LICE: Treat the mother hens for lice several times before the chicks hatch and make sure there are no mites.

DOUBLE UP: Have the chicks come out several broods at a time and double up the chicks giving 15 to 18 to each hen.

COOPING: Small "A" coops to accommodate one family are good. Where hens agree, larger coops or colony houses may serve the purpose for several hens and their broods. Keep the broods away from the general flock. Move the coop frequently. Don't let the hen out when the chicks are small and especially early in the morning.

ARTIFICIAL BROODING
Of artificial brooders there are quite a variety both good and bad. Any brooder should provide a temperature of 90 to 100. Concluded on page 8.
