NATURAL BROODING Some hens never make good mothers. If the setting hen is not suitable, transfer

some of the eggs before hatching to one that is, if you ler. FREE FROM LICE: Treat the mother hens for lice several times before the chicks hatch and make sure there are no

DOUBLE UP: Have the chicks come out several broods at a time and double up the chicks giving 15 to 18 to each hen. COOPING: Small "A" coops to accomodate one family are good. Where hens agree, larger coops or colony houses may serve the purpose for several hens and their broads. Keep the broads away from quently. Don't let the hen out when the chicks are small and especially early in

the morning. ARTIFICIAL BROUDING Of artificial brooders there are quite variety both good and bad. Any brooder should provide a temperature of 90 to 100


