On Thursday evening last word was received in the village that Miss Leah Robinson, who for the past five weeks has been seriously ill with typhoid fever, had passed away. Hopes were entertained she last few days for her recovery but in the slight abatement of the fever the young lady had insufficient strength and in spite of the best of medical aid she succumbed to the disease.

The deceased young lady, who was in her 25th year, was the only child of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Robinson, and was born and raised on the farm, where she died. Of a kind and pleasant disposition her friends were many, and her christian life was shown in the active part taken by her in the work of the Methodist Church and Sunday School, of this place. A life long member of the Church and Sunday School she will be remembered as one who was always ready and willing to do her part. For many years she has been a consistent member of the Choir, and not only in the church and home, but throughout the community at large, her demise has left a void that cannot be filled.

The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon last and the attendance, in a way, signified the esteem in which she was held, it being the largest seen in this vicinity for a long time. A short service was held at the house after which the cortege proceeded to the Church for service and interment. The service was taken by the Rev. H. L. Smith, whose discourse proved full of the thought to his hearers, as well as solace to the mourners.

France, June 25th, 1918.

Mrs. John Westerby, Jarvis, R. R. 3.
Dear Friend,—I expect you think I might write at some other time except when I have something to thank you for. Well I suppose I should but I write quite a few letters home and conclude that to be good for the neighborhood. I, along with the other boys from home, have learned how closely akin are the home forces and the overseas forces how essential one is to the other and I wish to express how grateful I feel towards all those who have helped us. I appreciate the continual kindness being shown towards me. It makes me want to be worth it, but I fear that often I might be more of a force for good, however, I trust that in the end we will return with the victory flag. I am confident that we will. I believe we could deal such a smashing blow to-day that the enemy would be crushed but it would cost too much. Our generals are considerate. Haig felt for the kin of those who fell and now Foch prefers to use brains in place of men. Hindenburg hasn't the brains so he must resort to what is at his disposal, his men. They can't last—they are dwindling daily—victory is certain—it is only a case of time. It is you who must keep things going during this time. You can and you will. We are all well and the old machine gun section are mostly within twenty feet of me now. All smiling and I'll tell why they are smiling. There is an argument on and at such times the truth is often stretched.

Just a Word of Warning

Many boarding house keepers and others engaged in the restaurant business in a small way, particularly in the smaller towns and villages, have not yet taken out licenses as they are required to do by the Canada Food Board. These parties are therefore liable to the penalty provided by the regulations. It must be borne in mind that a public eating place subject to license is, according to Food Board Order No. 46, "Any place whatsoever, where meals to the number of fifteen or more per day are served or sold to others than members of the family or household of the proprietor or caterer." Persons supplying meals to the number as stated must obtain licenses, otherwise they are liable to fine or imprisonment or both.
