### County Council

#### SIXTH SESSION

#### FIRST DAY

Cayuga, July 27, 1918.  
Council met at the call of the Warden. All the members present except Buckley, Hudspeth and Wilton.

McQuillan-Pyle—That we resume business with the Warden in the Chair, carried.

The minutes of last meeting were read and on motion of Smelser-Holland were adopted as read.

The following communications were then read:

1. Departments of Agriculture, re Seed Wheat.

2. Department of Public Works, re Office for Representative of Taxation at Cayuga.

3. Letter from the Clerk, that the following auctioneers have paid their licenses: Frank Montague, Dunnville; Wm. M. McQuillan, Dunnville; A. E. Smith, Caledonia; Benj. Hurst, Hagersville; John Deming, Jarvis; H. B. Merril, Hamilton; Thomas Doonan, Dunnville; L. R. A. F. W. Wigg, Cayuga; Robert E. Hagler, Algonquin, Ill., U.S.A.; Joseph Huty, Binbrook; J. S. Fleming, Hagersville, Robert Sinnet, Cayuga.

Clerk of Peterborough County, asking the Council to Memorialize the Provincial Government to refund the counties the money collected as automobile licenses to be expended on the main roads of the county.

5. County Clerk of Waterloo County, requesting the County Council of Haldimand to petition parliament to study economy.

Sawle-Pyle—That Messrs. Smelser, Lishman and McQuillan be a Special Committee on Communications. Carried.

Pyle-McQuillan—That we do now adjourn to allow the different committees to meet. Carried.

Smithers-Pyle—That we resume business with the Warden in the Chair. Carried.

Sawle-Bradford—That the report of the Road and Bridge committee be received and read. Carried; To the Warden and Members of the County Council:

Gentlemen—Your Road & Bridge committee met at Caledonia on Monday, July 22, and opened tenders for the repairs on Caledonia bridge. The tenders are as follows: John Ritchie Contracting Co. \$2688 H. H. Lishman 3159 J. A. McAlpine 3900 McAlister & Taylor 6500

The cement is estimated at 241 barrels, to be furnished by the county, to cost \$600, making the low tender with cement \$3200 without any extras. This amount being in excess of the appropriation and a matter of importance, it was considered good policy to refer the matter to the whole Council.

Your committee was in correspondence with Mr. Smith, the Indian agent of the Indian Reserve, who wished to meet us at McKenzie bridge, about four miles west of Caledonia. This bridge is not situated on the county line. It is a bridge 80 feet long, of pile construction, and is about ready for a new bridge. The bridge is on the Indian line within the township of Oneida, and it is a question whether we are responsible or not.

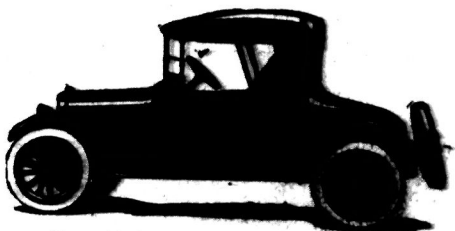
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
