### DEATH OF CAPT. AMSDEN

Capt. William G. Amsden son of Mr. L. G. Amsden, vice-president of the Consolidated Optical Company, was yesterday officially reported to have fallen in action on August 8. His parents and other members of the family are at present at Honey Harbor, where the sad intelligence will be broken to them this morning by Mr. George Winlow, a close friend. Capt. Amsden went overseas as a lieutenant with the 220th Battalion a year ago last May, and had been in the line for over a year. He graduated B. Sc. at Toronto University, and was engaged as engineer with the Consolidated Optical Company when he enlisted. Capt. Amsden was in his 30th year and unmarried and lived with his parents at 35 Howland ave., Toronto. Lieut. L. E. Amsden, a brother, is in France with the 220th Batt.—Mail and Empire.

### Died in Hamilton

The death of William Hind, Hamilton, occurred at the general hospital of that city on Wednesday last. Being struck down with a stroke on Sunday last he was taken to the hospital on Tuesday but in spite of the best of medical aid he passed away on Wednesday night, aged 76 years.

A short service was held at the house on Friday evening by the Rev. Jas. Awde, interment being held at the Methodist church cemetery, Jarvis, on Saturday last.

The late William Hind has been a resident of Hamilton for the past nineteen years. He was the principal of the Ottawa street school and was a highly respected adherent of the Wesley Methodist church. Previous to his residence in Hamilton he taught in this village for nine years and his death will be regretted by many acquaintances in this district.

He leaves to mourn his death besides his wife, five daughters: Mrs. Thomas Wainwright, Moosomin, Sask.; Mrs. R. L. Horning, Victoria, B.C.; Mrs. George Sharpe, Winnipeg; Mrs. H. B. Biggar, and Miss Louie at home; one son, Ernest, of Victoria, B.C.; two sisters, Mrs. Thomas Harris, of Hagersville, and Mrs. Elizabeth Marr of Simcoe, and one brother, Watson Hind of Toronto.
