County Council

SEVENTH SESSION

Cayuga, Thursday, Aug. 8, 1918. Council met pursuant to adjournment. All members present. The Warden in the chair.

Smith-Pyle—that we resume business with the Warden in the chair. carried.

Minutes of last meeting were then read.

Bradford-Lyons—that minutes as read be adopted. carried.

A communication was then from the County Clerk of Frontenac requesting a resolution indorsing the abolition of titles in Canada.

McQuillan Pyle—that the farmers be granted the use of the Court House grounds for the purpose of holding a farmers' picnic on August 22. carried.

Pyle-McQuillan—that no action be taken re letter from J. W. Bradshaw, county clerk of Frontenac, re abolition of titles. carried.

Sawle-Smith—that a pedlar's license of \$20 be put on all parties doing business in Haldimand in purchasing junk and that the Clerk prepare a by-law to this effect and that the bill be read a first time. carried.

Houser-Wilton—that this Council do now adjourn to allow the different committees to meet. carried.

Holland-Smelter—that we resume business with the Warden in the chair. carried.

Smith-Smithers—that the report of the Home committee be received and read. carried.

REPORT OF HOME COMMITTEE

Cayuga, August 8, 1918.

To the Warden and Members of the County Council:

Gentlemen—we your Home committee beg leave to report as follows: There are 32 inmates in the Home—19 males and 13 females, an increase of one since our last report. Erwin Pettit was committed by Wm. McQuillan, reeve of Moulton, on July 13.

We went through the Home and interviewed the inmates and found them well satisfied with the care they were getting.

We have finished reshingling the barn.

We have purchased two thoroughbred Holstein cows for \$225 to replace one cow that died and one we disposed of for beef.

The Manager and Matron are asking for an increase in salary. We would recommend an increase of \$100 per year to commence July 1, 1918.

We have examined the vouchers of the different accounts for maintenance, compared them with the accounts and found them correct. We would refer the same to the Finance committee for payment.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

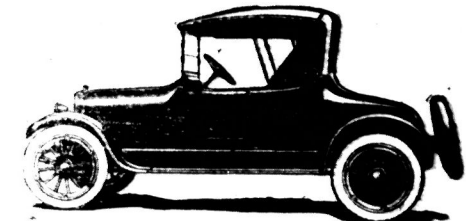
