



Ottawa

James Townson, Nanticoke.
Deeply regret to inform you, 739/734 Pte. James Ralph Townson, Machine Gun Corps, officially reported died of wounds at No. 5 Canadian Clearing Station, August 10th. Gunshot wounds in abdomen.

DIRECTOR OF RECORDS

Pte Townson was 22 years of age and went overseas in 1916 as a member of the 114th Batt. He went to France in February of 1918.

Shoup-Buckley—Resolved that Geo. Webb be appointed Sheep Valuator in place of Wellington Biggar, who has removed from the Township and the Clerk attach the Corporal Seal to this resolution to give it the force and effect of a By-Law, carried.

Shoup-McBurney—Resolved that we exempt the Michigan Central Railway from a business tax from August 17th, 1918 to December 31st, 1919, so that they may furnish Stone Screenings to the Municipalities of Walpole, Hagersville and Jarvis and the County Good Road system, of the county of Haldimand and the Clerk be authorized to prepare a By-Law for the same.

McBurney-Laidlaw—Res. that leave be granted to introduce a Bill to provide for the general expenses of the Township of Walpole for 1918 and that the same be now read a first time, carried.

Shoup-McBurney—Resolved that the Bill be now read a third time, passed, signed, numbered and entitled a By-Law as in the original motion.

Buckley-Laidlaw—Resolved that leave be granted to introduce a Bill to raise money for the various School Sections in the Township of Walpole 1918 and the same be now read a first time, Bill read a second and third time, and passed, carried.

Laidlaw-Buckley—Resolved that leave be granted to introduce a Bill to Exempt the Michigan Central Railway Company from a business tax on Stone Screenings used in the Township of Walpole, Jarvis, Hagersville and County of Haldimand. Good Road System and that the same be read a second, third time and passed.

Laidlaw-Shoup—Resolved that we do now adjourn to meet on Saturday, 21st September in the Walpole Fire Insurance Hall, Jarvis, at the hour of 10 a. m. carried.
