Badge for Food Production Service

The Organization of Resources Committee, representing the Ontario Government and Legislators in their plans for encouraging the production of food as a war-time service, has had a Food Production Service Badge for awarding to children and others who have done good work during past season. It offers the badge to War Production Clubs, Agricultural and Horticultural Societies, Resources Committee Branches, School Boards, Teachers, Women's Institutes, Sunday School Clubs, or any other group of responsible persons, as a fraction of its cost for distribution locally at public meetings. In the distribution of these badges the purposes are:—to commemorate the splendid response made throughout Ontario to the Empire's call for increased production in the season of 1918; to stimulate community interest in local achievements; to recognize deserving effort in national service, and to encourage a continuance of the work next year and as long as the world's need of food is urgent. The badge may be awarded for other services beside gardening. Boys or girls who have helped materially in farm work during their holidays; those who have worked with their parents in a work-while home, garden scheme, or those who have raised poultry or produced pork will also be entitled to the badge. The badge, a sample of which may be seen at this office, will be cherished in after years at a very interesting war time souvenir.
