

BRITISH MEET COOL WELCOME IN ENEMY LAND

Atmosphere of Hostility in the Frontier Towns of Germany.

TOMMY IS CALM

Paces the Hun With Steady Eye, and No Vindictiveness.

(By Percival Phillips.)

With the British Armies of Occupaon, Cable — Sunday we crossed the German frontier at 9 o'clock, as the church bells were calling the mass and came into Melmedy without ceremony as quietly as we used to enter a familiar town of our allies behind the old trench lines.

People passed on the way to church to stare at the first two troopers riding with drawn sabres at either side of the valley road. One could not help thinking of the contrast with that other advance more than four years ago when the occupation of a hostile town meant the seizing of hostages, the ruthless oppression of defenceless civilians and, perhaps, massacre in the market place. I saw a memorial of such a tragedy on the road from Spa to Melmedy yesterday. In a little roadside orchard hardly five miles from the frontier had been erected a rough wooden sign, "Here lies 17 hostages, shot by the Prussians." I wonder if the people of Malmedy remembered the fate of their Belgian neighbors as they watched the British cavalry ride in.

Our men treated them with scrupulous ccurtesy and ever had a friendly smile for the little children who, too mand for the extradition of the visyoung to hate khaki, waved their itor. What proof of his abdication, hands and shouted in delight. squadrons moved with care through the crowded streets. Tommy kins faced the bitterest enomies with the calmest, steady eye and without a trace of vengefulness and desire to repay old scores in the Prussian way. Some of the people of Malmedy, who have known only the Prussian type of have known only the Prussian type of soldier, did not conceal their fear in the first hour of British occupation. Perhaps their conscience troubled them.

GOOD, BUT NOT BEAUTIFUL

Many people were still a-bed when the cavalry entered Malmedy. As we passed the first houses the windows, and men and women still heavy with sleep stared, scupidly at the unfamiliar figures below. families emerged dressed and unperturbed to watch the little procession from the balconies. the centre of the town the crowd began to drift hesitatingly from open doors to the pavement. A few hats were doffed and there were smiles of amusement from some women, and I discovered after considerable trouble they were apparently diverted by the shape of the British metal helmet. It is a good hat, but it is not beautiful. When they saw that their merriment was observed they became sober, like children caught in fault. There was no de-

rision, they seemed simply amused. Just beyond the market place the first patrol of Dragoen Guards halted for a moment. From a corner house came forth a curious figure, a middleaged civilian in a business suit and a derby hat, with a great white brassard on his left arm with the inscription, "Burgerwein," and a rifle strapped to his back. He approached the officer in charge with a half military salute. The officer asked questions about the road. While they were being answered five other civilians wearing the same official armlet emerged in a casual way and stood on the curb as if anxious to be of service. They were members of the Malmedy town guard, who had taken control after the departure of the German army. In the crowd were a number of discharged German soldiers. Some had learned English; one had got his vocabulary

The only real hate of the good old Prussian sort during the morning was the product of seven middle aged men of military bearing who remained at the back of the crowd glaring at the cavairy, all write with passion. I passed one German officer in uniform stationing before a shop with an oraerly at his side. He saluted the British officer correctly and watched the men with a professional eye. He is detailed to duty at Malmedy under the armistice commission. The inhabitants of Malmedy were anxious to assure us that they meant to obey the army of occupation. Placards were posted three days ago by the burgomaster, warning the inhabitants they must be civil and correct in their intercourse with the allied armies.

Kupon gave me a grimmer picture of the real Prussian. The inhabitants of the town were mostly indoors while the cavalry advanced, spurred and went through. A few prosperous looking, well-dressed men were strolling in the high street. Young men and sweethearts were promenading, and the general atmosphere marked that of hostility. While we were trying to ask questions of prisoners and interned civilians the number were reduced by women in the house opposite, who threw open the windows with an angry word and summoned their two sons from the assemblage. FALSE PRETENCES.

Kaiser's Late Abdication Proves Holland Wrong.

London, Cable - The Morning Post, commenting on the former German Emperor's belated abdication, says:

"It is possible that the document purporting to be the formal abdication of the German Emperor is genuine, and it is equally possible that it is nothing of the kind. In either case, the instrument contains no word concerning the succession or the dynasty, nor is it countersigned This by any responsible official.

"If, however, by virtue of this paper William II. has, in fact, abdicated the Throne of Prussia and the overlordship of Germany, he has been staying in a neutral country under false pretences. THE DISLOYAL

Told in Annual Report of Attorney-General.

Only 6,000 Enemy Aliens Arrested.

Washington, Cable - The story of how enemy agents have been caught. disloyalty suppressed, draft slackers apprehended, dangerous German interned, explosions and other sabotage prevented, and enemy secrets ferreted out, for use against their armies abroad, was given to the public to-day in Attorney-General T. W. Gregory's annual report. Through a great corps of Department of Justice civil officers, secret agents, and citizen volunteers, this big job of policing has been accomplished, said the Attorney-General, with a minimum disturbance to the normal life of communities, and with constant effort to avoid encroaching on freedom of speech, ac-

tion and political criticism. Referring to enforcement of the Espicnage Act, Mr. Gregory said: "This department throughout the war has proceeded upon the general principle that the constitutional right of free speech, free assembly and petition exist in war time as in peace time, and that the light of discussion of governmental policy and the right of political agitation are the most

fundamental right in a democracy." At the same time, the Attorney-General explained, the department had tried to deal severly with propaganda. having for a deliberate purpose the disintegration of the country's war

strength. "One of the distinct achievements of the American people," he said, "has been the maintenance of order, the comparative failure of enemy activities, and, speaking broadly, the general self-control and self-restraint exhibited throughout the country in critical

situations." The Attorney-General dsclosed that only 6,000 enemy aliens have been arrested on Presidential warrants and examined with a view to internment, and that "a considerable number" of these have been placed in intermment camps administered by the army. The balance have been paroled.

MATERIALS ARE RELEASED

Britain Relaxes the War Regulations.

Other Concessions to Follow Soon.

London, Cable - Dr. Christopher Addison, Minister of construction. announced to-day that the situation as regards the supply of materials to manufaturers is such that domestic control can now be considerably relaxed. Orders have already been issued enabling manufacturers and others to utilize for their ordinary civil trade existing stocks of a number of raw materials heretofore controlled, and the ration of material allowed to trades for peace work has in many instances been largely in-

Restrictions of imports and exports have already been relaxed in certain directions, and further concessions of a more comprehensive character are in contemplation.

Of first importance in national interest, says the Minister, is the utilisation of the producing capacity in such a manner as to provide for the re-establishment at the earliest possible moment of the industries and shipping of the United Kingdom, in order to secure a maximum of employment and output. Adequate provision should also be made for full discharge of obligations of Great Britain to its allies, particularly in regard to the reconstruction of their devastated areas.
