The tenth Annual Meeting of The Haldimand Municipal Association will be held in the Court House, Cayuga, on Friday, February 15th, 1918, commencing at 10 a.m.

This is probably the most important meeting the Association has ever held, although through its efforts in the past a great improvement has been made in Municipal Administration in the efficiency of Municipalities in training, and advising them in the discharge of their important duties in the best interests of the ratepayers.

K. W. McKay, Esq., Editor of the Municipal World, and County Clerk and Treasurer of the County of Elgin, will address the meeting on the following important subjects,—in the afternoon at 1 p.m. "Assessors Duties," "Councils Business System," "The Clerks Office," and Question Drawer. Dr. McKay is admittedly one of the best authorities on Municipal Administration in the Province.

S. L. Squire, Esq., Municipal Adviser, Provincial Highways Department, will also address the Association on "Good Roads as a Municipal Problem". This is a most important subject for the County of Haldimand as improved transportation facilities in this county is a vital feature of Farming operations, and business activities and success.

All interested in Good Roads traffic will be welcome to hear these problems discussed.

Harrison Arrell, Esq., County Clerk and Solicitor will also address the Association on some line of Municipal Work. Addresses will also be delivered by John W. Holmes, Esq., Town Clerk of Dunnville, Ex President of the Association and John Senn, Esq., President. In addition to these addresses the routine work of the Association members will constitute a very busy and interesting day for all interested in Municipal work.

Jarvis, Feb. 5th, 1918.  
Pursuant to notice the Municipal Council of the Village of Jarvis met in the Temperance Hall, all members present with the Reeve in the Chair.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and on motion of Barwash-Pond were adopted.

The resignation of James Noble as Village Treasurer was received and on motion of Holmes-Pond was accepted.

Mr. Chas. McCarter presented a claim for adjustment of Local Improvement frontage.

Walters-Barwash—That claim of McCarter and Allen for adjustment of L. I. frontage be laid over until the next meeting. Carried.

A request from Mr. Jos. Barber for the balance of guarantee on side walk contract, was received.

Holmes-Barwash—That the cheque of \$47.05 issued to J. Barber on August the 30th, 1915 be confirmed, being a settlement of the balance of guarantee of work done in 1912 and 1/2 of guarantee for work done in 1914 leaving a balance due Mr. Barber of \$8.00 and interest for 3 years at 5%. Carried.

Walters-Barwash—That the account of J. Barber for \$9.20 be accepted and paid and that the Reeve issue his cheque for the same. Carried.

Barwash-Pond—That Wm. Macbell be appointed to take care of street lights at salary of \$12.00 for the year 1918. Carried.

Holmes-Barwash—That Andrew Rodgers be appointed Treasurer of the village at a salary of \$25.00 and that the seal of the Corporation be attached to this resolution to give it the effect of a by-law. Carried.

Barwash-Walter—That all cheques issued by this Council shall be signed by the Reeve and Clerk and that this resolution be delivered to the Bank of Hamilton, Jarvis, and the seal of the Corporation be attached to the same to give it the effect and power of a by-law. Carried.
