coners Were Punished In the Good Old Days.

Our forefathers deemed hanging too good for people who went about delibrately poisoning other people. They substituted for that punishment boiling to death, the first to suffer this enalty being Richard Rosse, coult to he bishop of Rochester in the reign of lenry VIII.

In medieval times in Europe poison rs when detected were usually broken alive upon the wheel after having first been given a taste of the rack while in prison awaiting execution as a sort of entle reminder of what they had pres ently got to go through,

ven this dreadful death was not leemed sufficiently painful, and new and special modes of punishment were uvented.
