"One evening, when I was yet in my nurse's arms. I wanted to touch the torpeya the man t tea urn, which was boiling merrily. It was an early taste for bronzes. I suppose, but I was resolute about it. My mother bade me keep my fingers back. I insisted on putting them forward. My nurse would have taken me away from the urn, but my mother said:

"'Let him touch it, nurse.' "So I touched it, and that was my first lesson in the meaning of the word 'liberty.' It was the first piece of liberty I got, and the last that for some time I asked for."-Youth's Companion.

"Don't delude yourselves with the idea that a man won't be frightened under fire, because he will he. He'll be badly frightened if he is a normal human being.
