A copy of the Ontario Motor Headlight Law, which was recently passed by the Ontario Legislature, shows that in order to meet with its requirements a large number of motor car owners will have to change the headlights on their cars. The new law says: "It shall be unlawful to carry on a motor vehicle any lighting device of over four candle power equipped with a reflector unless the same shall be so designed, deflected or arranged that no portion of the beam of the reflected light, when measured 85 feet or more ahead of the lamp, shall rise above 42 inches from the level surface on which the vehicle stands."

Sock League Work

In this great war Haldimand has done its part in supplying men to fight for the freedom of all mankind. Our heroes have been in the war since its commencement and have acquitted themselves so that any county might well be proud of them. The women of home have also been doing their part. Over 8000 pairs of socks from the Haldimand Sock League were sent to the Haldimand men last year, and many letters of appreciation have been received from them.

At the Haldimand Sock League's annual meeting it was thought advisable owing to the county men being scattered over the Western front, to ask each organization to send directly to the men from its own locality, and the request has met with a hearty response. Haldimand county has many women's organizations, and through these nearly every man in France from here is being reached. Dunnville, with its surrounding organizations, supplied 298 pairs monthly last year, and is still carrying on the good work.

Caledonia W. I. supplies 200 pairs monthly; Jarvis W. I. and Red Cross 20 pairs per month to their own men and 20 pairs to the H. S. L.; Cayuga Red Cross 50 pairs per month directly to the men; Clunabral Sock League 36 pairs to Indians of the 207th batt., besides some to their own men; Nanticoke Patriotic Society and Sock Club 21 pairs per month; Grand River W. I. 20 pairs monthly; Hagersville supplies 16 of their own men besides the H. S. L. receiving 13 pairs; Sandisk 6 pairs monthly with an additional 10 pairs this month to the H. S. L. South Cayuga W. I. 12 pairs frequently to the H. S. L.; Decewsville W. I. 24 pairs to the H. S. L.; the Varenay, Fisherville and Seikirk W. I.'s are also in the good work, but their reports have not received; York Red Cross and No. 2, Oneida, Red Cross supply 75 pairs monthly; Canfield W. I. 13 pairs monthly.

The socks sent to the H. S. L. are sent to men who are not otherwise provided for. The addresses of soldiers who have not received socks are requested; also addresses of soldiers will be supplied to any organization or persons who will supply socks to the same by Mrs. Baxter, Secretary of the Haldimand Sock League, Cayuga.

The Haldimand Sock League desire to express their appreciation to the different organizations for the hearty response which the call for help has received.

Spring Wheat Seed for Ontario

The world demand for wheat in 1918 justifies the greatest possible effort towards increased production. The small acreages of fall wheat put in last fall will mean increased acreage in Ontario available for spring wheat. The Ontario Government is co-operating with the farmers in order to provide seed. It has purchased 50,000 bushels of No. 1 Marquis Spring seed through the Seed Branch of the Federal Department of Agriculture. More will be purchased if necessary to fill needs.

DISTRIBUTION—Seed is sold only in 2 bushel bags. Carloads will be placed at certain points in the province where less than carload orders can be filled, the purchaser paying local freight from such distributing point to his own station. Where Farmers' Clubs or other organizations bring in carload lots, the price at their local station will be the same as at distributing points.

WHERE TO BUY—Purchases may be made either in the warehouse at the distributing points, or orders may be placed with the nearest District representative of the Provincial Department of Agriculture or they may be sent direct by mail to the Markets Branch, Department of Agriculture, Parliament Buildings, Toronto.

PAYMENT IN CASH—Price is \$2.74 per bus at distributing points. In all cases without exception, cash must accompany the order. Send remittance by express cheque, postal note, post office or money order, made payable to the Ontario Department of Agriculture, Markets Branch.

ORDER EARLY—In the event of the requirements of the Province being underestimated, there may not be enough seed to go round. It is advisable in order to insure having their orders filled that purchasers should place orders filled as soon as possible. All orders are subject to confirmation and will be filled in the order received. As seed is delivered in 2 bushel bags, order should be for even number of bushels, and no order for less than 2 bushels can be accepted.

Names of Distributors at local points will be announced later. Local distributing points at present decided are Hamilton, Simcoe, Welland and Brantford.
