### The Storm

The storm which hit this section on Friday night, the 11th inst., completely isolated the village, no trains arriving from Friday night until Tuesday, a snow plow getting through on that day on the Air Line. The first mail train arrived from Hamilton at Wednesday noon. A snow plow was derailed at Delbi while "Old Granny" got stuck at Aylmer and stayed there. The storm is reported to be the severest known to the oldest inhabitants, snow banks piling up in the most unusual places. Towards the lake shore the wind raged a terrific velocity, playing havoc with a number of windmills, outbuildings, etc.

The storm developed an unique and the all popular personage of a fuel controller in the village. On Saturday and Sunday the flow of gas became so weak that on Monday the village council seized a car of hard coal that had been ordered for the farmers and was standing in the local freight yards, said coal being distributed to those suffering from lack of fuel.

### Letters of Appreciation

London, Dec. 31, 1917  
The Walpole Institute, Jarvis, Ont.,  
Dear Friends,

I wish to thank you for the excellent Xmas cake which I received a few days ago. I believe it is the first I have ever seen this year, as you know the sugar shortage is very severe in England and it is against the law to use a cake, in fact most things seem to be against the law nowadays, except "York of course". We boys look forward eagerly to letters and parcels from home, we can now appreciate to the full "Be it ever so humble" and if you could see the satisfaction on the faces of the boys when they receive their parcels and the joy of opening it to see the good things from "home", I am sure you would feel rewarded for your trouble. We all expect to spend the next Xmas in dear old Canada, if we are in the land of the living at that time.

I shall not tell you any war news because you know as much about it, if not more, than we do here. You may be interested to know that sugar rationing of 1 lb. per person becomes effective tomorrow and we expect that in a short time, butter, margarine, bacon, jam, etc. will also be rationed, it seems the only fair way when things are so scarce. About the only thing we get in unlimited quantities is London fog, we eat it, drink it, breathe it, get lost in it, miss our train, lose our patience, in short most everything can be blamed to a London fog. If I had a way of carrying it I would like to have a piece of it out and take it back to Canada.

I am on cash duty to-night, a staff is kept every night on duty until 11 o'clock to pay the men who are on leave from France. They are all cheery, happy fellows, who are optimists, they tell us some stirring tales of life in France.

I have received official permission to take photographs so I hope to take quite a collection back home. London has many intensely interesting places, so many in fact, it is impossible to see them all. I am expecting to go to watch night service in Westminster Abbey, when we are through here.

Now I must close, I hope all the members of the Women's Institute will have a happy and prosperous New Year.

Just a few lines thanking you very much for the parcel which I got the 26th. Just one day after Christmas. I hope you all had a pleasant Christmas, although it is hard to have that while this awful war is still going on, but we have to make the best of it and hope for the better.

I may say that I had a very pleasant Christmas at this hospital and I did justice to the roast beef, plum pudding and Christmas cake. The boys here were certainly very good, it was more like home, and that is saying something. My arm is getting along fine. I am able to walk around and enjoy the fresh air and there is lots of that here for we are right on the sea. Fritz comes over this way when he makes his trips to London but so far he has left us alone. Anyway I feel a lot safer here than I do in the front line, so I do not mind it so much. Well I must close thanking the Jarvis people for their kindness.

After each had subscribed to the declaration and qualification of office the council began business with the Reeve in the Chair.

The minutes of last meeting were read and adopted. Several communications were also read and dealt with by the Council.

Shoop-McBurney—That this Council appoint Edward Wright a member of the local Board of Health for one year and Fred Lindsay Sanitary Inspector during the pleasure of the Council. Carried.

By-laws were passed confirming the appointments confirming the appointments of assessor, auditors, members of the local board of health, and sanitary inspector.

Shoop-McBurney—That we do now adjourn to meet in the Council Chamber, Jarvis, on Saturday, February 16, at 10 a.m. Carried.

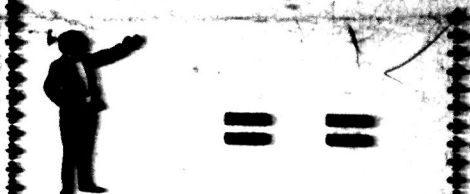
