Cards and Matches

The attention of all agents, wholesalers,
retailers or other dealers, is finally drawn
to the provisions of the Special War Re-
venue act, to the effect that all packages
of playing cards and matches on hand for
sale on July 1 must have affixed thereon
war stamps of the requisite value.

The tax on playing cards is 3 cents for
every package containing 54 cards or
fractions thereof. Each package which
contains more than 54 cards and not more
than 108 cards will be subject to a tax
of 19 cents.

The tax on matches is one each for 100
or fraction of 100 contained in a package.
