Tendered Reception

The people of Jarvis and vicinity paid their respects on Monday evening last to one who had done his bit for "King and Country", in the person of Corp. Fred Pettit, of this place, who returned home on Saturday evening last from Toronto where he had arrived the evening before from overseas.

On Monday evening all the cars available were called into commission and a procession was formed to meet the train arriving from Hagersville, at which place the hero had gone. On arriving at the station it was found that the train was some two hours late and the whole party motored to Hagersville. On their return a public reception was given the returned hero on the Band Stand at the corner of Main and Talbot streets. The following men were on the platform and delivered appropriate addresses: Rev. H. L. Smith, Dr. Jacques, M.P.P., Rev. H. L. Roberts, and Rev. A. W. Hare.

The hero was introduced by Mr. R. A. McCarter. The Reeve of the village, R. W. Smith, acted as chairman. At the conclusion of the addresses a purse of \$75 was given the returned soldier as a slight token of appreciation, the presentation being made by Dr. Jacques. In a short neat address the hero thanked the people for their kindness.

Corpl. Pettit enlisted with the 114th Bn., "Brook's Rangers," and was in that unit until it was disbanded in England. He was through the Vimy Ridge scrap fell a victim to the Hun bullet at the battle of Passchendaele, when his arm was badly torn. He has since been in different hospitals in England.

His many friends, and they will multiply for having done his bit, extend to him the welcome hand of friendship and respect and wish for him and his long, happy and prosperous life.

It was with startling suddenness that the angel of death came to Jane Ionson on Wednesday evening last at her late residence on Main Street. The deceased, who was in her 73rd year, had enjoyed comparatively good health up to a few hours of her demise, when an acute pain seized her causing heart failure. Miss Ionson was borne in Walpole in 1847, the daughter of the late Thomas and Elizabeth Ionson, and was an adherent of the Methodist Church. Four brothers and one sister, and a large number of relatives and friends mourn the loss of an exceptional kind and quiet Christian sister and friend.

The funeral was held on Saturday afternoon last to St. Paul's cemetery. Rev. J. H. Ross officiating at the Church and grave.
