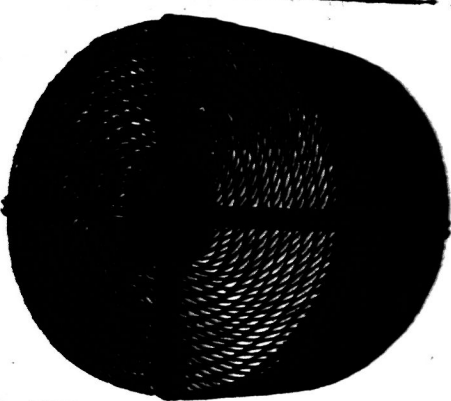

Petitions Booked Here

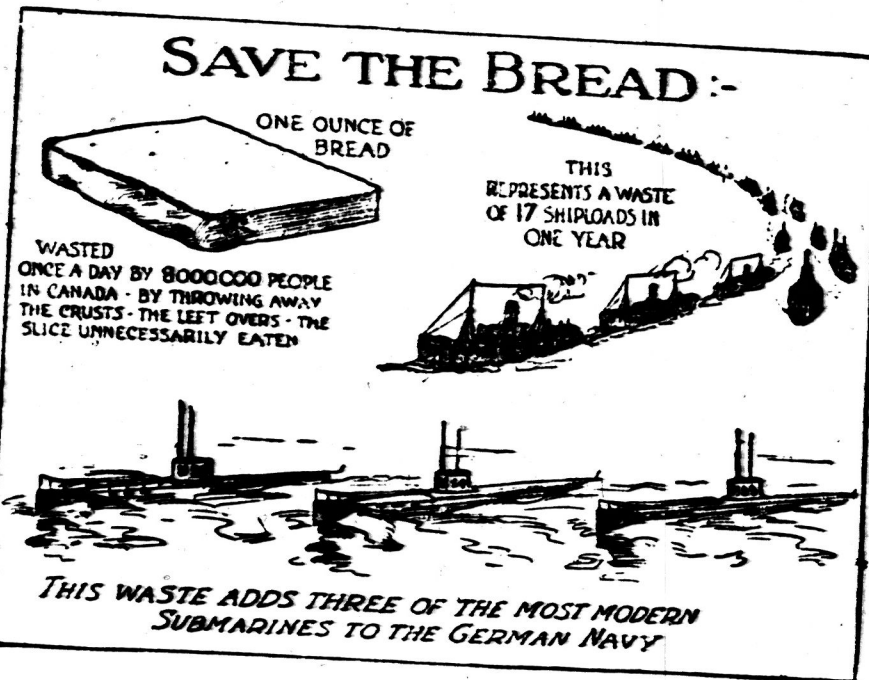

Ottawa, July 15.—Apparently there will be a flood of habeas corpus proceedings in order to release conscripted soldiers.
H. H. Martin Burrell, Acting Minister of Militia, was personally served with twenty-seven writs when he walked out of the Cabinet Council shortly after one o'clock today. The writs were served by Rupert S. Broadfoot, an Ottawa lawyer, acting on behalf of R. Colter, lawyer, of Cayuga, Ont.
The writs were all for Haldimand county farmers who are already in uniform at Aldershot Camp, near Halifax. Nearly half the writs were on behalf of men bearing German names. Among those on the list were Frank M. Vanderburgh, Leonard Hoffman, George Shrubbs, Raymond J. Honsberger, Wm. J. O. Lint, Arthur W. Hight, Earl Schier, George Herman Erbert, Edgar N. Schwaeyer, Lloyd W. Snyder and Clayton M. Reichert.
The petitions will come before the Ontario Court, Toronto, on Thursday.

TOURIST TRAFFIC

The volume of tourist traffic from the United States this year has been considerably lessened by misleading press dispatches appearing in American and Canadian papers regarding the Canadian Registration Act. It was unwarrantably stated that visitors to Canada from the United States would be compelled to register at a post office before they could secure accommodation at a hotel, that passports were absolutely necessary, and more recently the absurd rumor was widely circulated that women from the United States would not be allowed to return home. This latter ridiculous report is specifically denied by Mr. W. D. Scott, Superintendent of Immigration, who officially designated it as "absolutely without any foundation in fact."
Senator Gibson Robertson, a member of the Immigration Board, and Chairman of the Registration Board, is usually positive in his denials of the other mischievous reports. The real facts are, according to the official statement of the Registration Board, that the Registration Act does not require people permanently resident in Canada and does not even require anyone living in the United States that no registration at a post office is necessary, and that no passports are required. The possession of papers showing the holders to be American citizens is all that is necessary to cross into Canada. At the International boundary line the holders of these papers are given an identification card by the Canadian Immigration Official which enables the visitors to travel freely where they wish without any interference on the part of Canadian officials.

Senator Robertson, Chairman of the Registration Board, has announced that "neither in the instructions issued, nor the regulations for Canadian registration is there anything that would indicate desire upon the part of the government to impose restrictions upon Americans or aliens, entering, travelling in, or leaving Canada."
The experience of those American visitors who have already come to Canada verifies Senator Robertson's statement, but unfortunately there are many across the border who have not read this announcement, and may still be influenced by the false reports to stay at home, spoil their vacation, and cause a mutual loss to themselves and to Canada.

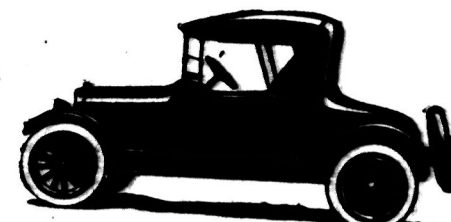
