last revised Assessment Roll of the said
Municipality to be entitled to vote in
the said Municipality at Elections for
Members of the Legislative Assembly and
at Municipality Elections and that said

remains there for inspection.

An Error

engaged in the Canadian Pay Records
office, London, England, states that he
expected to sail for Canada on July 13.
His many friends will be glad of his re-
turn.

Any S. O. S. boys or farmers from ages
13 to 19 who have served three months
on the farm, are requested to call upon
the local representative, Rev. A. W.
Hare, for their service buttons and cer-
tificates, or for any other information or
assistance.

It is announced by the Canada Regis-
tration Board that persons losing their
registration certificates should make ap-
plication to the Central Registrar, Cana-
da Registration Board, Ottawa, for a
new one. When making such applica-
tion persons should give all the informa-
tion possible as to the number of the
number of the last certificate, the name
and address of the registrar who issued
it, etc. Communications of this nature
addressed to the Central Registrar may
be sent free, and there is no charge for
the new certificate.

Private correspondence for destina-
tions in territory occupied by the
enemy—excepting enemy occupied Bel-
gium and the enemy occupied parts of
France—may now be addressed direct
in the ordinary way instead of being for-
warded through an authorized inter-
mediary. Such correspondence, how-
ever, must only deal with private news
and will be subject to censorship. Item
which contain any information what-
ever in regard to military, economic or
political conditions obtaining in Canada
or in any allied countries or which con-
tain undesirable information of any kind
will be detained. Business communica-
tions from Canada to destinations in
territory which has been certified enemy
territory under the Trading with
the Enemy Proclamation requires a
license from the Secretary of State for
Canada. Correspondence intended for
destinations in enemy countries (as dis-
tinct from enemy occupied territory) or
to those destinations in enemy occupied
France to which correspondence may be
forwarded, may still be sent through
the medium of Thos. Cook & Son, 530
St. Catherine St. West, Montreal.
Application should be made to Thos.
Cook & Son, Montreal, for information
in this connection.
