Unveiling of Honor Roll

A very beautiful and impressive service
was held in Knox church on Sunday eve-
ning last, by way of commemoration and
honor to those who have fought and are
now fighting for King and country. The
occasion was the unveiling of the Honor
Roll of Knox Church and Chalmers
church. The preliminary to unveiling,
was a most eloquent, touching and pa-
triotic address, couched in most beautiful
and splendid diction, given by Dr.
Jacques, M.P.P. The church was honor-
ed in having one of Canada's noblest and
most patriotic mothers to perform the
act of unveiling, Mrs. J. C. Gardiner.
Mrs. Gardiner has given four sons. One
fell at Lens, another at Passendale and
two others who have been wounded.

Mr. Geo. L. Miller most ably and well
trailed the military history of the men on
the roll. Three have given their all,
and many others have been wounded.

A unique part of the service was a short
address by Corp. Joseph Newton of Ham-
ilton. Corp. Newton with Wilfred Wil-
son of Rockford was the D.C.M. and
Silver Cross of Montenegro for rescuing
under fire Capt. Kilmer, who was badly
wounded in the inauguration of the first
day light raid. The music given by the
choir was splendidly rendered as was
the duet given by Miss Anguish of
Brantford and Miss Cook of Milton.

Both were highly commended. The en-
tire service was of such a lofty and eleva-
ting tone as to be long remembered.

Octogenarian of Walpole

Mr. Hugh Saunders died at the village
of Nanticoke, Ont., on Monday, 22nd of
July, 1918, in his 82nd year.

His father, the late Samuel Saunders,
J. P., was one of the pioneer settlers of
the Township of Walpole, born in Ire-
land, where he married Miss Letitia Kirk-
wood. Shortly after their marriage they
emigrated to Canada and settled in the
Township of Walpole on a bush farm, and
after years of toil, enduring the privations
of the early settlers, he succeeded in
clearing up his farm. Nine sons, all hale
and hearty fellows, and two daughters
were brought up on this farm. One of the
sons, John Saunders, M. A., was an hon-
ored and respected clergyman of the Meth-
odist Church. All the family have passed
over to the better land, excepting one
son Joseph, a contractor and builder of
Fort William.

The subject of our sketch was born in
the Township of Walpole on the 3rd of
June in the historical year of 1837. He
was strong, robust and healthy, capable
of any amount of endurance and when
quite a young man, in the early sixties
when the British Columbia gold mine
were being advertised and puffed up,
Hugh Saunders and several others were
caught with the enthusiasm of the yellow
fever in the distance, packed their grips
and started for the Pacific Province. He
remained in that Province for about five
years, when he returned to his native
township with enough money to buy a
seventy-five acre farm and to erect a
frame house thereon. Shortly afterward,
so the story goes, he wedded and won Miss
Mary Ann Richardson, a neighboring
farmer's daughter, and she has proved to
be an honored and respected helpmate.

Both were strong and capable of any
amount of endurance and toil, went to
work and cleared up their farm, and the
old frame house was pushed back and a
beautiful brick residence placed in front.
Here they resided until the year 1901,
when they retired from actual farming and
removed to the village of Nanticoke,
erecting a comfortable dwelling on Erie
street, where he remained the rest of his
life.

Mr. Saunders in politics was a staunch
conservative, a true and loyal British
subject, in religion a consistent member
of the Methodist Church, serving with
ability as Trustee and Member of the
Quarterly Board for years and took an
active part in having the old frame chapel
at Nanticoke removed and a beautiful brick
church erected in its place. When able
to attend church he was always present,
never allowing cold or stormy weather to
prevent him from attending the services
of the Church. By his death the Metho-
dist church loses a valued member and
the State a good citizen.

The following members of his family
are left to mourn his death: his aged wid-
ow, his eldest daughter, Ettie, wife of
William Slaght of Beaton, Letitia, for
several years a public school teacher, now
the wife of Jacob Brown of Villa Nova,
Ida also a successful school teacher for sev-
eral years, now wife of Stanley Field of
Nanticoke, Emma, wife of Arthur Brown
of Walpole, and William only son, who
resides on the old homestead and like
his father a very successful and prosper-
ous farmer.

The funeral took place from his late
residence and was conducted by his pas-
tor, Rev. Mr. Mercer, assisted by the
Anglican clergyman, the Rev. Mr. Brand,
who very kindly visited him during his
illness. The funeral was largely attended
by relatives and friends. The remains
were laid to rest in the Union Cemetery
on Thursday afternoon, July 25th, 1918.
The relatives, and especially the bereav-
ing widow, have the sympathy of the entire
neighbourhood.—Com.
