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

# Octogenarian of Walpole

Mr. Hugh Saunders died at the village f Nanticoke, Ont., on Munday, 22nd of July, 1918, in his 82nd year.

His father, the late Samuel Saunders, J. P., was one of the pioneer settlers of the Township of Walpole, born in Ire land, where he married Miss Letitis Kirkwood. Shortly after their marriage they emigrated to Canada and settled in the Township of Walpole on a bush farm, and after years of toil, enduring the privations tures, etc. Miss Eva Thompson has returned to of the early settlers, he succeeded in clearing up his farm. The subject of our sketch was born in the Township of Walpole on the 3rd of June in the historical year of 1837. He was strong, robust and healthy, capable of any amount of endurance and when quite a young man, in the early sixties when the British Columbia gold mine were being advertised and puffed up' Hugh Saunders and several others were caught with the enthusiasm of the yellow fields in the distance, packed their grips and started for the Pacific Province. He remained in that Province for about five years, when he returned to his native ownship with enough money to buy a seventy-five acre farm and to erect frame house thereon.
