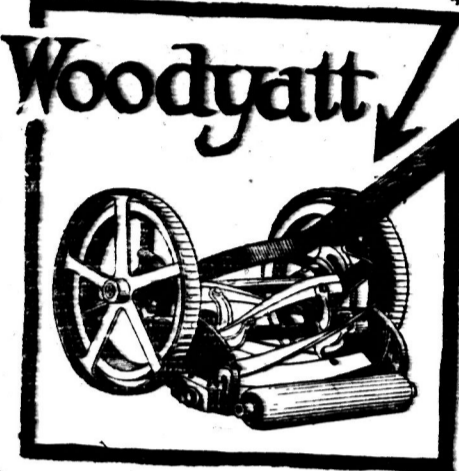

The cherry crop in Springdale Section is not expected to be very good owing to the blossoms being injured by frost.

Brookville fair board has cancelled its exhibition for this year, as hundreds of troops are quartered at the grounds.

Pte. Percy Anger, who went overseas with the 11th Batt. and was wounded and gassed, has returned to his home in Dunnville.

Mr. Harry Marlett, who has been in business recently on Peel street, Simcoe has sold his grocery store to Mr. Egan St. Thomas.

Constable Pepper, of Simcoe, has resigned his position with that town and proposes going to Port Dover as soon as relieved of duty.

C. E. Addison, undertaker of Otterville, has purchased a very beautiful motor hearse, said to be the most beautiful hearse to be seen in western Ontario.

An honor roll containing the names of 90 former students who are either in active service or have been, and 10 of whom have paid the supreme sacrifice, was unveiled in the Aylmer high school recently.

The increase in freight rates on the the Branford and Hamilton electric railway, authorized by the Dominion railway board, 15 per cent. that being the amount of increase granted to steam railways.

The marriage of James Bright and Miss Edith was solemnized in Trinity Church, Simcoe, on Monday, June 3rd, at 2 p.m., Rev. A. B. Farney, officiating. The required announcement of banns was fulfilled last Sunday.

It is now illegal to deal wholesale in flour, bran, shorts or any feeds made from wheat or grains, or products of wheat or grains, or hay or straw, without first having obtained a license from the Canada Food Board.

Seed corn of 100 bushels or less may be imported now from the United States without an importation permit. All that is necessary is to make application to the War Trade Board, Washington, who will grant an export license.

Owing to the brake of a cog wheel in the new gas engine last week has necessitated the shutting down of the local grist mill. Repairs are expected immediately and when received the mill will again running in a very short time.

It will be illegal to operate a public eating place without a license from the Canada Food Board. The time has been extended from June 1st to July 1st, owing to the rush of applications which more than could be dealt with in time by the Board's office staff.

A huge elk horn was unearthed at Clinton by the action of the flood and ice on the river bank. The horn measured 54 inches in length, 43 inches in circumference at the base, and has four prongs, the largest of which is 21 inches in length and 6 inches in circumference.

Every effort is being made to provide sufficient supplies of sugar for the coming season. The Food Board says that while restrictions in the consumption of sugar in given ways are necessary and must be strictly enforced, still by the present arrangements there will be plenty of sugar for canning purposes when the season arrives. Every effort should therefore be made to preserve fruit and vegetables to the utmost permitted by increased production.

Dr. W. M. McGuire, Simcoe, who is president of the Ontario Dental Association, was in Brantford last mid-week attending a meeting of the committee of this district. It was decided to hold the district convention in Simcoe on Wednesday, June 19. It will be held at the club house of the Norfolk Country Club. The district includes Elgin, Oxford, Brant Waterloo, Haldimand and Norfolk counties. It is hoped to have some very prominent speakers in dental circles viz: proposed absorption of the Dental College by the University.—British Canadian.

Procedure of Registration

On June 22nd every person residing in Canada, male or female, British or alien, of sixteen years or over, must attend one of the registration booths located in his or her district, and there observe the procedure explained below.

Where to Register

Every person required to register has the privilege of registering at any of the public places provided for that purpose. The location of all such places will be specified in proclamations posted conspicuously.

The card shown in the illustration is a facsimile of the registration card for males. An advertisement showing the card for females appears in another paper.

Study the questions carefully so that you will be able to answer them promptly when registering. If you have any special qualifications, or feel that your services would be more beneficial to the country in some other line of work, say so.

While all are compelled to register on Registration Day, it is not contemplated by the Government to force the sick, feeble and aged to turn out. If such persons will notify the Registrar prior to June 22nd of their inability to attend at a place of registration, an effort will be made to register them at home, provided the request is reasonable and justified.

Remember the Day—June 22nd—Remember the Hours—7 a.m. to 10 p.m. Register early and get your Certificate for your own protection.
