In accordance with arrangements made by the Ontario department of agriculture, 34 of the 75 tractors completed by the Ford Motor Car Co., and purchased by Ontario farmers, have been shipped to their destination. Altogether the government has sold 99 tractors.

An increase in the price of cigarettes was decided upon by the largest tobacco manufacturers in Montreal recently. Under the new scale of prices given out cigarettes will cost wholesalers 20 per cent. more, and the ultimate consumer will be called on to pay for the increase.

The present 10c packages will cost 12c or two for a quarter and 15c packages will cost 18c or two for 35c.

### Voted in Favor of By-Law

Seldom has an election created so much interest in this Municipality as that which occurred on Thursday last which resulted in favor of the Gas By-Law by a vote of 47 to 82. Talk waxed hot up to the voting day and from appearances the whole village was out electioneering.

On Thursday both sides were out after the votes and thanks to the perfect weather the motor cars provided a lot of free rides for the electors. Up to the counting of the ballots either side had no inkling as to how the issue would be decided and those strong for the By-Law were by no means easy in their minds as to the result. However when the ballots were counted it was found that the pros. had a comfortable majority of 35, the vote being 82 in favor and 47 against leaving a majority of 35, the total number of votes cast was 131 there being one ballot that was not marked.

Apparently the opinion of the majority of the electors was that they realized that it was a very hard matter to buck against the gas company and rather than lose the gas they voted accordingly.

In speaking to Mr. Stringer, manager of the Co.'s interest at Simcoe, the Record was informed that the gas company would commence in the near future to revise the system of the village and we understand that the company intends giving the consumers of this place as good a service as can be had anywhere and that Jarvis will have a good pressure for the coming winter, and that no kick will be forthcoming.

**Concert a Success**

The concert given in Chambers' Hall on Friday night last by the Choir of the Jarvis K. O. Church was greeted with a success that was filled to over-capacity. The play was entitled "The Singing School", and the different characters elected a response that was most gratifying to the participants. **Important Points in Hatching Chickens**

During the hatching season the poultry house and particularly the nest should be kept clean. Clean water and a supply of whole grain should be accessible to the sitters and a dust bath should be provided also. If more than one hatch is being taken off, clean out and disinfect the nest after each hatch and put in new sod and fresh litter. Dust the hen with insect powder before putting her in the nest and again in a day or two before leaving the pests with the chickens. It is a good plan to put into the dust bath a little dry sulphur or ground tobacco.

Be sure also that the house is free from mites. These little pests get into the cracks and corners of the building and at night as the hens are resting, they come out of their hiding place, get on the hen's body and it does not take very many of them to make the hen so uneasy that she cannot sit. In some cases the mites become so troublesome that they actually worry the hens to death.

**HOW TO GET RID OF THEM**

Clean out the house and thoroughly sweep, not forgetting the windows, walls and ceiling. When this is all swept out clean, use a garden hose or a stiff brush and hot water. See that everything in the cracks and crevices is washed out. After this is done allow the house to dry for awhile and if everything then appears to be clean, use a good disinfectant and be sure that the solution is forced by the spray or brush right into the cracks and crevices. If the mites are bad use boiling hot water followed by coal oil and liquid lice killer or ice paint. Be sure that this goes into the cracks and crevices according to the above treatment, in all probability the mites will be exterminated, but it is advisable in the course of three or four days again to inspect for the mites and perhaps to repeat the dose once more.

**Issues' Head Taken For Evidence**

Brantford, April 29.—Major Gordon J. Smith, Superintendent of the Six Nations Indian Reserve, this morning announced that he had been instructed by the Indian Department at Ottawa to engage the services of Mr. W. S. Brewster K. C., to prosecute those guilty of committing indignities on the body of the late Alfred Isaacs, a member of the Six Nations.

Alfred Isaacs died in the Brantford General Hospital, April 1, from injuries alleged to have been inflicted by his half brother, George Duncan of this city, during a fight in the latter's home on Sunday, March 31. Duncan was arrested and charged with murder, the charge being later reduced to manslaughter. He is now out on \$4000 bail. Shortly after the body of Isaacs was interred at Sour Springs Cemetery it was reported that the remains had been disinterred. This was found to be correct and a few days afterwards the authorities admitted that the head had been severed from the body and retained by the authorities to be used as evidence in the trial of Duncan.
