5. That there being no objection to J. W. Sheppard using the Crown Attorney's office for Registration of Taxation, he be permitted to use the same.

6. That no grant be made at the present time to the Salvation Army.

7. Letter from Department of Public Highways was taken up this morning.

All of which is respectfully submitted. H. B. Sawls, Chairman.

Wilton Houser—that the report of the committee on communications be adopted as read. carried.

Smithers-Lyons—that the report of Home committee be received and read. carried.

To the Warden and Members of the County Council:

Gentlemen:—We, your Home Committee beg leave to report as follows:

There are at present 34 inmates in the Home, 21 males and 13 females, 3 less than in our last report. There has been one death, John W. Spence buried at his own expense. Archibald Green has been discharged by consent of the Warden, W. G. Clark reeve of Walpole, by paying \$3 per week for board. Miss Laura Dell discharged by consent of U. E. Stewart, reeve of N. Cayuga, by giving her consent to leave the county.

Benjamin Hartzell committed on April 18th by H. J. Pyle, reeve of Dunnville.

We find everything in a very satisfactory condition in and around the home.

We have examined the vouchers of the different accounts for maintenance, and on comparison find them correct. We would refer the same to the Finance Committee for payment.

Cayuga, May 9, 1918. New Part—Quantities for new barn at House of Refuge:

19 squares of shingles in roof, 16 ft. lumber for sides, 1100 ft.; East end 32 ft. lumber, 750 ft.; sheeting 34x36 ft.; 6 posts 16 ft. long, 1 post 14 ft. long and 12 rafters 36 ft. long.

Shingles for old barn, 25 squares, over stable door 12x18x8 ft. high.

We would recommend that Mr. Brown see to the work of putting the cement foundation in and to oversee the work. And that he superintend the work of the barn, building the porch and fire escapes be done after the Council in June at the House of Refuge.

About Drowning

Numerous drownings occurring recently in lakes of high elevation have pointed out a serious menace to swimmers as well as the necessity for the utmost care on the part of fishermen or others from the lowlands who sojourn about such waters.

It is a well known fact that persons physically sound, dwelling in locations near sea level, find themselves short of breath under the slightest exertion when in high altitudes.

Thus when such a person plunges into a mountain lake he finds that the exertion of swimming quickly exhausts his energies. It is the shortage of oxygen due to the elevation that accounts for some of the recent tragedies of Big Bear and Little Bear lakes in the San Bernardino mountains. These lakes, more than a mile above sea level, are frequented by fishermen and pleasure seekers from the lowlands.—Popular Mechanics Magazine.

A Much Married Soldier.

Mr. Justice Bray's recent complaint that the war has led to a serious increase in bigamy echoes what French moralists said during the Napoleonic war. The Emperor's soldiers were notorious for marrying a new wife in every place they were stationed, and one young brave, Jacques Nottier, aged twenty-five, when called before a criminal tribunal on a charge of marrying three women within eight months, acknowledged that, so far as his memory served, he had wedded fourteen French, one Italian, one Swiss, and two Dutch wives in the course of his brief career.—Tit-Bits.

Thunder Clouds.

Thunderstorm clouds are very variable in height—from 500 to 2,000 feet. The clouds in thunderstorms may be very deep—from two to five miles and more—hence the appearance as to distance in very deep regions. Cumulus clouds are intermediate, and generally occupy a position from 2,000 to 5,000 feet above the earth.

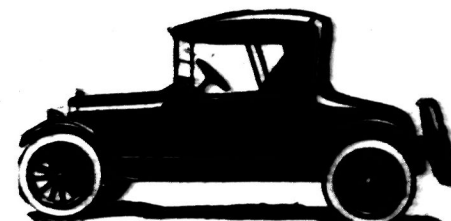
