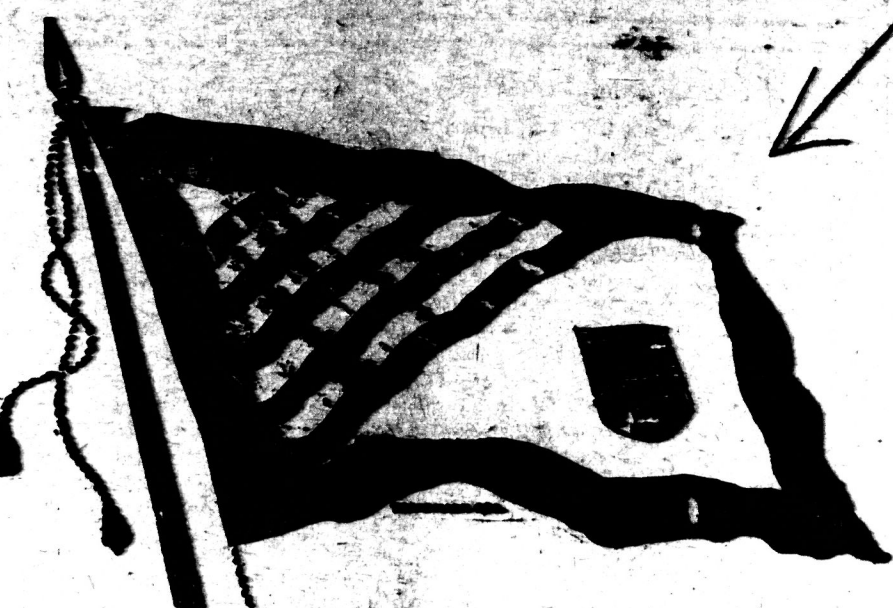

Dunnett was well known in these parts, having worked in this vicinity for the past eight years, where he was favorably known. He has been serving in France for the past two years.

Jarvis celebrated the news of Peace on Thursday last and although somewhat premature was none the less emphatic. Although the news was received in the morning the village did not celebrate in proper form until the afternoon about five o'clock. A procession was formed, composed of automobiles, rigs, etc., which paraded through the village, all the bells of the village sending forth an accompaniment of noise at the same time and helping to swell the volume of thankfulness that Victory had been given us. At the conclusion of the parade the crowd assembled at the Band stand where a number of prominent citizens made patriotic addresses. A large number of the citizens visited Hamilton where they viewed the gates of the industrial city. No celebration took place on Monday.
