France, Aug. 31, 1818.

Dear Ethel, This is a swell evening, fine and cool. R. B. Brock. I am enjoying a little rest and sure am glad of it as we have been having no cinch lately. This is the last of August and we sure have had wonderful weather, only W. J. Bailey. rained about one or two days. Only hope ext month is not too wet.

I received the parcel from the Women' Institute all O.K. and many thanks. I got it the night we came out or the line and you may be sure how I appreciated it, lis Bros. being tired and hungry. The cookies and shocolates were fine and was very glad to get the socks as we have lots of very long marches these days and a clean pair of socks sure helps a lot.

You will have read all about the battle by now. It was a great surprise for Heinie and a number of prisoners were taken and they looked bewildered at the size of the advance.

We got quite a number of souvenirs, etc. This is some German note paper I am using. You will notice it is marked by holding it to the light "Berlin Extra Test." We also come across some of his canteens and salvaged a few eats.

We saw some great air fights and they are sure exciting. One afternoon our airmen brought down three Heinies in about 5 minutes and they all came down in
