TERRIFIC ENEMY LOSSES IN USELESS COUNTER-ATTACKS

Foes Mowed Down Like Wheat By British Machine Guns and Shells.

Over 10,000 Prisoners and Over 60 Big Guns Captured.

With the British Army in France, Cable.—Despite the serious menace which the British established yesterday over the Hindenburg line by their capture of ridges northwest of St. Quentin, the Germans this morning continued to nurse their grievances without renewing on a large scale their costly counter-attacks of last evening.

ENEMY LOSSES HEAVY. The enemy losses yesterday were extremely heavy, both in the early fighting and in the numerous counter-attacks which were thrown in toward night, in a desperate attempt to regain part of the lost ground.

DESPERATE BATTLE AT EPEHY. At Epehy, where the renowned German Alpine troops were holding a desperate battle was waged throughout the day. These enemy troops were perhaps the finest in the German army.

BOMBED OUT HIDING PLACES. On the right flank there was especially bitter fighting about Honnon village. The British had captured part of this place the day before, but the Germans still held a section of it with machine guns trained from every house.

BRITISH RETAKE TANKS. In Gauche Wood the Germans had four British tanks which they had previously captured. These tanks were used as machine gun fortresses and used to shell the British before taken.

BRITISH THROUGHNESS. To the north in the course of the battle the British pushed through to their final objectives, and even beyond in some places, with their accustomed thoroughness and disregard for their personal fate.

PRISONERS DECLARE THAT BECAUSE OF this smoke the British never knew where the Australians were going to strike next, and as a result there was more or less confusion among the Germans opposite them.

THE eastern part of Fresnoy was still in the hands of the enemy early this morning, with the British holding the western section and pressing the defenders hard.

BRITISH REPORT. London Cable.—The prisoners taken by the British in the operations begun Wednesday northwest of St. Quentin now exceed 10,000, according to Field Marshal Haig's reports.

NEEDED EXPLANATION.

Washington, D. C., Report.—The betrayal of Roumania and elaborate advance plans of Germany and her Russian Bolsheviki tools for suppressing and murdering loyal Roumanians, Russians and Poles are exposed in detail by to-day's chapter of the astounding secret Russian documents which the American Government is giving to the public.

Other instalments of the series have described how the Bolsheviki leaders, Lenin and Trotsky and their associates, were bought by the Germans for millions in gold and engineered their bloody overthrow of Russia for the benefit of their masters. Now the story is told of how, while the Brest-Litovsk peace conference farce was still in progress, the Bolsheviki were sending hired agents into Roumania to disorganize the armies of Russia's ally, dethrone the Roumanian king, and turn loose the German armies occupied there for service in a great offensive on the western front.

The second phase of the latest disclosure shows the Bolsheviki, in German direction, undertaking not only to kill refractory Roumanian generals, but to shoot individually and wholesale Polish soldiers who were refusing to be sold to the Germans and patriotically keeping the field against their enemies. One of the documents transmits orders from the German intelligence service to "Take most decisive measures, up to shooting en masse, against Polish troops," and to institute surveillance of institutions and persons including the Roman Catholic Polish clergy.

Exploratory notes by Edgar Sisson, who obtained the documents, and many details lacking in the papers themselves, including a story of how the Roumanian Minister barely escaped assassination after being arrested by the Bolsheviki and released through the efforts of Ambassador Francis and other diplomats.

The texts of the documents follow: TROTSKY AND ROMANIA. The machinations of Trotsky, inspired by the German General Hoffman, for the disruption of Roumania are disclosed in the following:

DOCUMENT NO. 37. (Counter-espionage at the Stavka.) To the Commission on combating the counter-revolution:

Commander-in-Chief Krikenko has requested the counter-espionage at the staff to inform you that it is necessary to order the following persons to the Roumanian front immediately:

From Petrograd, Comissar: Kshil, Socialist; Rakovsky, Sailor Guiesin; and from the front the chief of the Red Guard Durasov. These persons should be supplied with literature and with financial resources for agitation. To them is committed the task of taking measures for the depopulation of the Roumanian King and the removal of counter-revolutionary Roumanian officers.

Director of Counter-espionage, Peierabend; Secretary N. Drahuciu. Note: This marks the beginning of large-scale work to disorganize the Roumanian army. That in its early winter phases its advances disappointing to Germany is evidenced by useful steps taken later by Gen. Hoffman and Trotsky from Brest-Litovsk, when in the middle of January, Trotsky, at the request of Gen. Hoffman, ordered the arrest in Petrograd of the Roumanian Minister Diamanti. The contents of this report, written by Hoffe, were telegraphed to Washington in February, and photographic copy of letter forwarded.

At about the same time the Roumanian public good reserves in custody within the Kremlin walls at Moscow were seized by the Russian Government. Diamanti was released from arrest at the demand of the united diplomatic delegations at Moscow, and on Jan. 23 he was ordered to Petrograd, being given less than 48 hours to prepare for the departure of a party that contained many women and children, ambassador Frances sought in vain of Zalkand, who was among his former Minister in the absence of Trotsky, again at best, for an extension of the time of departure. The Roumanian party was thrown preliminary on a train at midnight. It was delayed in Finland on one extreme and another, not immediately apparent, but in three weeks the Minister, leaving behind a large part of his people, was allowed to proceed to Torino. By good luck he reached there the day after the Red Guard left Torino to the White Guard. That day saved his life, for on the next day Sveltitzky, a Russian commissar who joined him in mid-February, was found an order to Trotsky to shoot him. Sveltitzky was shot instead.
