Haldimand County to Improve Roads

Cayuga, March 30—At the meeting of
the Haldimand County Council at the
Court House, Cayuga, the chief business
transacted was the adoption of the report
of the committee on Good Roads. The
report was as follows: To construct the
road from Westwoud County to Jarvis
by contract; to complete the road from
Nelles Corners to Cayuga; to construct
two miles on the Indian line from Nelles
Corners to the Fisherville side road; to
finish the road from Nelles Corners to
Selkirk; to spend \$7,000 in travelling
the River road from Cayuga to Caledonia;
to spend from one to two thousand dollars
in laying a foundation in a bottom in the
road near Bethel church, Canboro, which
is to be started next year; to continue
construction on the Rainham road to
South Cayuga village. These roads
amounting in all to 22 miles, to be con-
structed during the year 1919.

In all the appropriation is one hundred
thousand dollars for 1919, the expenditure
of which will earn approximately \$50,000
from the Ontario Government in grants.

The report was satisfactory to the Coun-
cil as a whole, especially to those mem-
bers interested in the county town, Cay-
uga, and Selkirk village, both of which
have suffered severely in the past from
bad roads. There will be when completed
a splendid road from Hamilton to Lake
Selkirk along the banks of the Grand
River and through one of the most pictur-
esque portions of Ontario.

Village Council

Jarvis, April 1, 1919.
Pursuant to notice the Municipal Coun-
cil of the village of Jarvis, met in the
Temperance Hall all the members pre-
sent, the Reeve presiding.
The minutes were read of the last meet-
ing.

Shaver-Walter—That the minutes of
last meeting be passed as read—carried.
Walter-Pond—That the account of
Jonathan Porter for \$7.00 and E. Alway
for \$6.00 be accepted and paid—carried.

Shaver-Miller—That the clerk be in-
structed to prepare a By-Law for the col-
lecting of an additional five per cent on
all taxes not paid on the 14th day of Dec-
ember in each and every year and that
the bill be read a first time.—carried.

That said By-Law be read a second and
third time and signed, sealed and num-
bered and entitled a By-Law as in the
original motion—carried.

Pond-Walter—That this Council auth-
orize the Clerk and Reeve to sign the pe-
tition regarding Prohibition as present-
ed by the Prohibition Alliance.

Shaver-Pond—That this council pro-
hibit the riding of bicycles after sundown
unless provided with a head light. In the
village of Jarvis. Any person viola-
ting shall be subject to a fine of not less
than one dollar or more than ten with
costs, and that this resolution have the
seal of the Corporation attached to give
it the full force and effect of a By-Law—
carried.

Shaver-Miller—That this council pro-
hibit the running of small wagons on the
sidewalks on Main and Talbot streets, in
the village of Jarvis, and for so doing will
be liable to a fine of not less than one dol-
lar on more than ten and costs, and that
this resolution have the Seal of the Cor-
poration attached to give it the full force
and effect of a By-Law—carried.

Miller-Shaver—That this council ap-
point Mr. Chas. Yocum, Speed Controller
of autos, for the village of Jarvis, half of
the fine to go to the man appointed, and
that the seal of the corporation be attach-
ed to this resolution to give it the full
effect of a By-Law—carried.

Pond-Shaver—That we now adjourn
until the first Tuesday, May at 7:30 p. m.
