### Erie Telephone Case

The hearing of the application to the Ontario Railway and Municipal by the Erie Telephone Co. Ltd., for an increase of rates took place at the Parish Hall, Hagersville, on April 11th.

The Board was represented by Mr. McIntyre, Chairman, Mr. Ingram, Vice Chairman and Mr. Francis Daggar, the Electrical Expert of the Board.

The case for the company was presented by the President and Manager, and after hearing the case for the Company the Chairman asked if there was any objection to the increase being granted, or any complaints as to the service of the company. Mr. J. T. Park, on behalf of the village objected to any increase being made.

In the absence of any complaints, or calls for a longer service the opinion of the Board appeared to be that the company was furnishing a service that met with the approval of their subscribers, and that there was no call for any change being made.

The decision was reserved and the company will be advised shortly as to the final disposition of the case.

### County Court

Mr. John Johnson, of Jarvis, was charged before Judge Hopkins, in County Court, last Friday, with converting property belonging to Mr. Benj. Falls, of Nelles Corners, to his own use. The property in question was known as the pickle factory property, formerly operated by Johnson Bros., sons of Mr. John Johnson. The latter was accused of selling part of an old building, covered by a mortgage held by Mr. Falls, and also of renting a building on the property after this mortgage was closed. The mortgage was signed by John Johnson instead of Johnson Bros., and he (Johnson) thought he owned some of the property. After hearing the evidence, both charges were dismissed. Falls gets the money for the property sold, and Johnson gets the money for the rent. Mr. Harrison Arrell acted for the Crown, and Mr. R. S. Colter for the defendant.—Haldimand Advocate.

### Mrs. T. E. Morrow Succumbs to Shock Following Operation

Shock, following an operation, caused the death at Holy Cross hospital early last evening of Mrs. T. E. Morrow, of 530 Twelfth avenue west. The deceased was a native of East Concord, N.Y., her maiden name being Ada M. Babcock. Thirty-nine years of her married life were spent in Jarvis, Ontario, and she had been a resident of Calgary for the past four and a half years.

A woman of sweet disposition and finest Christian character, Mrs. Morrow endeared herself to all with whom she became acquainted, and during her comparatively short residence in Calgary surrounded herself with a wide circle of very close friends, to whom the news of her passing will come as a great shock.

She leaves a family of five sons and her husband to mourn her loss. The sons are W. E. of East End, Sask.; F. A. of Gull Lake, Sask.; L. E. of Corry, P. A.; R. D. of Calgary; and J. E. of Winnipeg. Kathleen Morrow, of East End, Sask., a granddaughter, was a member of the family in Calgary, attending the Central High school. A brother and sister live in Erie, Pa. The remains will be taken to Jarvis, Ont., for interment.

The foregoing was taken from the Calgary Herald of Thursday of last week.

The late Mrs. Morrow was widely and most favorably known in Jarvis and vicinity having been a resident of this place for some thirty-eight years, and having moved with her husband to the West some five years ago. During her residence here she had endeared herself to the community at large and her demise is keenly felt by the whole community.

Mrs. Morrow had undergone two operations the former taking place two weeks previous. Apparently complications set in and the latter operation proved too much for the unfortunate woman and she passed away on Wednesday evening last.

The body arrived from the West on Tuesday morning. The funeral service was held in St. Paul's church and was taken by the rector, Rev. J. Hirst Ross, whose discourse was full of comfort and sympathy. Interment took place in the adjoining cemetery. The pall-bearers were:—Messrs. J. A. Burwash, D. Steel, C. G. Allen, R. A. McCarter, Wm. Abraham and J. B. McKicken. To the relatives and friends the deepest sympathy is extended by the whole community. ### Scotch Blood in the Canadian Record of Performance

The breeder of dual purpose Shorthorns is often puzzled to know where to look for a suitable sire. It is interesting therefore, to investigate the bloodlines of the noted Shorthorn sires and large producing cows whose names appear in the Record of Performance. The Record shows twenty-five Shorthorn bulls which have two or more daughters in the Canadian Record of Performance. Out of these bulls, nineteen are of straight Scotch breeding, and the other six are Scotch topped. It would seem, therefore, that straight Scotch and Scotch topped sires may be used successfully in dual purpose herds, which is a fact of great importance, because it is only by the use of sires of more or less approved beef type that we can hope to maintain the dual purpose qualities in the Shorthorn.

Coming to the large producing cows, we find twenty cows three years old and over with records of 400 lbs. of butterfat. One of these cows is straight Scotch, one is straight English, mostly Hates, and the remainder are of mixed breeding. Nine of these cows are by straight Scotch sires, eight are by Scotch topped sires, and fifteen out of the twenty possess one or more straight Scotch crosses.

Among the two year olds we find nine which have records of over 300 lbs. of butterfat. One of these heifers is straight Scotch, and another is nearly straight Scotch. Three of the nine are by straight Scotch bulls, and the remaining six are by Scotch topped bulls. Eight of the nine have one or more straight Scotch crosses in their pedigree.

The fact that these large producing females carry so much Scotch blood should be encouraging to those breeders of dual purpose Shorthorns who are anxious to retain beef with milk production.—G. E. Day, Sec. D. S. B. A., in the Canadian Farm.
