HONEY CAKE.

Three-quarters cup of honey, half cup sugar, 21/2 cups flour, 1 egg, 1/4 teaspoon ginger, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, ½ teaspoon ground cardamon see, ½ teaspoon cloves, speck white pepper, speck of salt, $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon sode, 1 tablespoon water, 2 ounces blanched almonds cut into small pieces or chopped. STUFFED DATES SUPREME. Two pounds dates, one-third cup black walnuts, one-third cup pimento cheese, is warnus, one-third cap panelto cheese, 78 teaspoon salt.

Wash the dates in warm water, dry them. Cut a slit in the sides and carefully remove the stones. Fill the cavity

with the cheese and chopped walnut paste, well blended with the sait. Firmly press the filled dates together and pack closely in a waxed paper lined box. STUFFED PRUNES.

One pound sweet prunes, one-third cup lack walnuts, ½ cup raisins, 1 tablespoon Select large, well-shaped prunes. Soak over night, dry open carefully and remove the stones. Mix chopped raisins, black walnuts and lemon juice. When thoroughly blended, refill the prunes with the mixture. the mixture.

PORK CHOPS AND ESCALLOPED POTATOES. Fill a baking dish with sliced raw potatoes. Almost cover with water or milk. Lay pork chops on top of these. Season with salt, pepper, dredge with flour. Bake in oven, turning the chops once. The fat from the meat will flavor the

potatoes nicely. STEAMED FRUIT PUDDING. One quarter pound seeded raisins, one-eight pound fat, one-eight pound citron, one egg, & cup sugar, one-quarter teaspoon nutmer, one-quarter teaspoon cin-namon, one-eighth teaspoon salt, onenamon, one-eignin teaspoon sait, one-quarter cup milk (generous measure), one cup breadcrumbs, ground fine; one-haif cup flour, one and one-quarter cups chop-ped apples. Rind and juice of three slices

of lemon, medium size.

Wash and dry raisins. Cut into pieces Wash and dry raisins. Cut into pieces. Slice citron very fine. Cream fat and sugar, add beaten egg and seasonings, also lemon juice and grated rind. Add milk and flour alternately. Dredge raisins with flour and add to mixture. Fold in breadcrumbs and then the chopped apples. Turn into a well-greased mold and steam five hours. Serve with maple sauce. This recipe makes enough for two meals.

CHICKEN SHORTCAKE.

To two cups of cold cooked chicken or roast veal add one-half cup of finely sliced mushrooms and one-half tablespoon of salt one-quarter tablespoon of grated onion. Season with one-half taplespoon of salt, one-quarter teaspoon of paprika, and one-eighth teaspoon of celery salt.
Add one and one-balf cups of chicken Add one and one-half cups of chicken gravy. Put between layers of shortcake two cups of gravy. Serve hot with corn fritters and head lettuce with French dressing. This may be served as the meat course for Sunday dinner in place of roast beef. This shortcake will prove a favorite method of using the left-over meats.
