Mrs. R. Taylor Interred

The funeral of the late Mrs. Robt. Taylor, whose death was chronicled in the last issue, was held on Saturday last, service being held in St. Paul's church here, with interment in the adjoining cemetery. The Rector, Rev. J. Hirst Ross, took the burial service and performed the last sad rites at the grave. His sermon, which was given to a packed church, was full of hope and comfort.

The late Mrs. Taylor, who was the sixth child of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. K. Jeffries, of Walpole, was born in 1874. She spent her girlhood days at her home in Walpole, and in 1891 she was united in marriage to Mr. Robert Taylor. For ten years after their marriage Mr. and Mrs. Taylor resided in the Canadian West and since that time have resided on the farm they now occupy. Two sons were given to this union, Robert, lately from overseas, and Ernest, both of whom are home. Of a loving, open and generous disposition the late Mrs. Taylor was known and loved throughout the countryside, her home always being noted for the open hearth to those who would enter.

Her sudden death proved a blow, not only to the immediate family, but to the town and community in general, as her sickness was practically unknown, except to a few friends. Although not in the best of health for some months past, the cause of the operation only became known during the past few weeks.

Besides, the bereaved husband and sons, she leaves to mourn her loss two brothers, George, of Lyndoch, and Robert, of Toronto, and one sister, Mary, of Minnesota.
