One Killed; Three Injured Near Dunnville

Clarence Appleton of Watford was killed, Miss Muriel Roberts of Woodhouse seriously injured, Miss Florence Franklin of Simcoe had her back badly hurt, and Miss Hargrave of Hamilton her nose broken, in an auto mishap about eight miles out of Dunnville Saturday last about 12.30. Patterson Innis of Simcoe, and a returned soldier, A. Green of Watford, were the other occupants of the car and escaped injury.

The party left Simcoe in the forenoon for Crystal Beach in Mr. Robert's car. Through some mischance, Appleton, who was driving, drove one wheel into a gutter and evidently attempted to recover too quickly. The car skidded and turned turtle, rolling over two or three times with the top up. Appleton expired a few minutes later in a farm house near by. Miss Roberts was carried into the same same place and the others taken to the Dunnville hospital.

Appleton was about twenty years of age. He served overseas for three years enlisting under age, and had recently returned from Europe. He was a young man of most excellent character.

The physician summoned to the scene from Dunnville was a coroner, and he decided that no inquest was necessary. The roadway at the place of accident was in splendid condition. There were no ditches and no public liability.
